Warsaw, Sept. 8.—(F)—(Havas, French News Agency Dispatch via Berne, Switzerland)—The Polish army, intact after the first week of war, has withdrawn from various sectors to pre-established defense positions along a 1,500-kilometer (931-mile) front.

(This dispatche is a Polish-French picture of the war in Poland.)

Poznan province, where Polish forces have held their original positions despite heavy German attacks, forms a huge salient between two German offensive zones, From this salient Polish cavalry and motored infantry are striking at the German flanks.

Budapest provides a good picture of what happens in a country whose government wields the blue pencil in the interests of remaining neutral.

Although the city is only 50 miles from German - occupied Slovakis, and only 150 miles from the scene of bitter fighting in Poland, people here know far less of what is happening than those in America.

Budapest has over 35 daily papers. Copies of all of them are available at the sidewalk cafes, where thousands, at all hours of the day and night, sit over their coffee reading every word in the tabloid-sized sheets.






