### New York Women Hurt In Auto Crash Here

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Reports that moujiks, or peasants, of Poland are marching side by side with invading Russian armies recalled today the important role they played in the last Polish war.

It was a bitter recollection to Count Anthony Potocki, nephew of the late Foreign Minister Maurice Bonomi of Poland and cousin of that country's present ambassador to the United States, Jerry Potocki.
