Asks Change Of Economy

Banker Urges Labor Management and Government to Aid.

Seattle, Sept. 27.—Philip A. Benson of Brooklyn, president of the American Bankers Association, called upon labor, management and government today to rebuke the nation's economy to meet the needs of the war.

In an address prepared for the association's 50th annual convention, Benson said he hoped that "a time of developing crisis there may be an abatement of the conflict between the philosophies of business and government."

"The least that we should accomplish in the end of discussion with our borders," he said, "we have had our full measure of drastic changes imposed by legislation. It is necessary to have an opportunity to digest these."

Rap Federal Money Stand

2,000 Bankers Hear Criticism of Excessive Government Control.

Seattle, Sept. 27.—Monetary policies of the national administration drew criticism here today at the first general session of the American Bankers Association's 50th annual convention.

About 2,000 bankers from all parts of the nation heard H. Donald Campbell, president of the Chase National Bank, New York city, and Dr. Paul C. Adair, San Francisco, president of the American Research Foundation, discuss what they termed excessive government control of some major financial functions.

Both speakers condemned any plan the government might have for eventual nationalization of the credit system.

"They said the country's business was better and would continue the upturn, but they warned of the dangers of a war boom and easy credit."

Fair Weather Aids Rescuers

Fears Grow Death Toll in Californian Storm May Exceed 100 Persons.

Los Angeles, Sept. 27.—Fair weather and calmer seas came to the aid today of a fleet of rescue ships, seeking 30 or more pleasure boats missing after an unprecedented, September storm. Fears grew, however, that the death toll would exceed 100.

Known or believed dead were 38 persons, 24 of them missing after the fishing boat Spray captured near Onizca at the storm's height Sunday night. At least 13 other vessels were wrecked.

Two occupants of the Spray were rescued. Sheriff's deputies said one of three bodies recovered in the vicinity was known to be that of a passenger, Mrs. Charlotte King of Los Angeles. The others, bodies of whom were unidentified.

Ten battleships and as many heavy cruisers, three aircraft carriers, 11 light cruisers, 43 destroyers, 11 submarines and 13 auxiliary and miscellaneous warships engaged in the simulated war.

In Cooperating in Returning Americans Who Are Now in Europe.

The State Department has announced that it has developed comprehensive plans for the return of the United States from abroad of American citizens, many of whom have to date been returned from the danger zone. The Red Cross states that it will cooperate in these government plans to the extent that Red Cross service may be necessary.

Los Angeles, Sept. 27.—Fair weather and calmer seas came to the aid today of a fleet of rescue ships, seeking 30 or more pleasure boats missing after an unprecedented, September storm. Fears grew, however, that the death toll would exceed 100.

Known or believed dead were 38 persons, 24 of them missing after the fishing boat Spray captured near Onizca at the storm's height Sunday night. At least 13 other vessels were wrecked.

Two occupants of the Spray were rescued. Sheriff's deputies said one of three bodies recovered in the vicinity was known to be that of a passenger, Mrs. Charlotte King of Los Angeles. The others, bodies of whom were unidentified.

Ten battleships and as many heavy cruisers, three aircraft carriers, 11 light cruisers, 43 destroyers, 11 submarines and 13 auxiliary and miscellaneous warships engaged in the simulated war.

In Cooperating in Returning Americans Who Are Now in Europe.

The State Department has announced that it has developed comprehensive plans for the return of the United States from abroad of American citizens, many of whom have to date been returned from the danger zone. 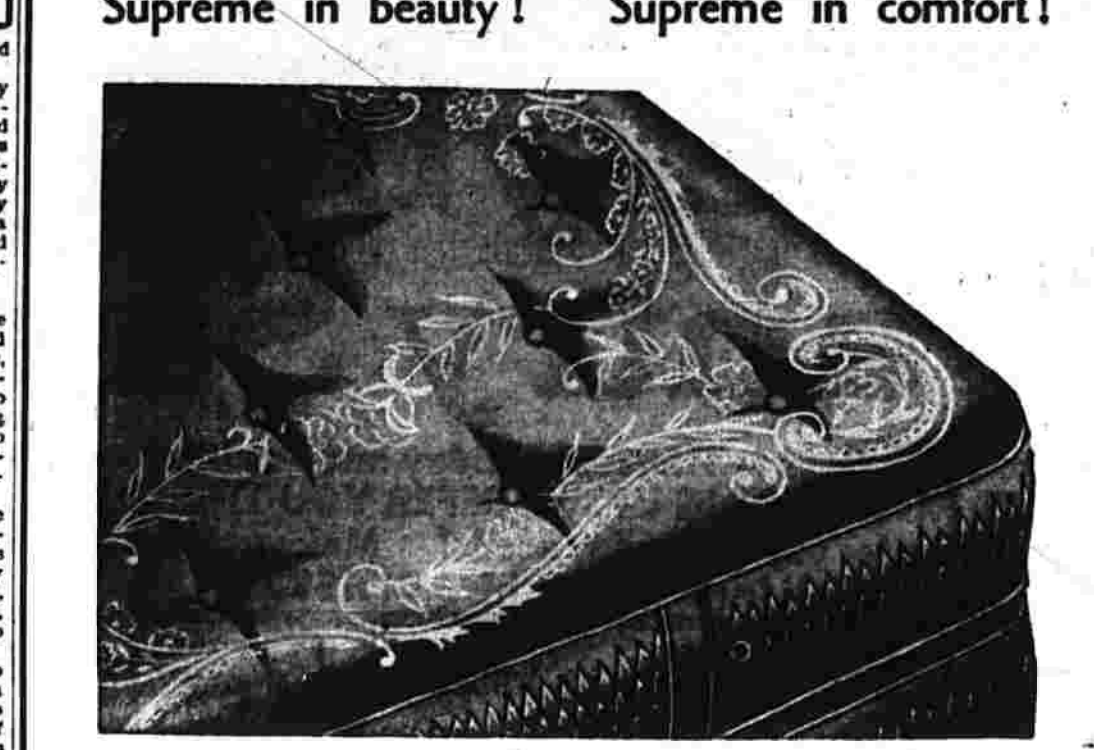
