

Another difference was that the trip was prepared long in advance with such ritual as signing statements absolving the French Army of any responsibility for our lives.

After a hard ride-over military roads to the east we reached the battlefield in rolling farmland studded with forests, streams, fields and villages like the New England countryside.

Action Typical

The action was typical of western front fighting thus far.

On the previous day French infantry had seized the German frontier station of Uberherm, a town of 2,500, in a surprise attinck just south of the Berus neights. They also had taken St. Oran, a tiny German settlement of two farms and a chapel, north of Berus.

On the Berus crest French guns pounded a German pillbox observation post controlling the heights. French infantry under cover of woods on the valley edge were swinging carefully east in an effort to cut around to the town of Berus behind the heights.

As I watched French guns fired rhythmically with each detonation sending echoes through the valley, A white stone tower which once marked the heights siready had been ientroyed. Britain is banking much on securing victory through the economic strangulation of Germany. The Anglo-French Allies figure that Germany, which lacks supplies for a long war, cannot obtain sufficient foodstuffs and other sinews of warfrom eastern Europe or even Russia, and must collapse in the long run because of the blockade.

The French Armies which have occupied German territory on the western front are busy digging in ar a precaution against a German drive with the feliure of the peace offensive.

French authorities astimate that

French authorities estimate that they hold about 150 miles of Ger-man soil, containing some 65 vil-lages. This is chiefly in the rich Saar region.
