Russia Resumes March To Increase Influence

For First Time Since Defeat by Japan Giant Bear Reaching Out to Expand Territory.

Soviet Russia, by her expansion in Poland and her diplomatic maneuvers along the Baltic and the Danubian, shows signs of resuming the forward march to territory and influence that was interrupted after the last war.

For the first time since defeat by Japan in the war of 1904-5 the giant bear is reaching out again. Almost bloodlessly she has recovered much of the Polish territory that was lost in the World war, the Bolshevik revolution and the debacle of imperial Germany.

Swiftness has moved to regain the dominance of the north Baltic. She is working toward an understanding with Turkey on control of the Dardanelles.

From the ninth century into the early years of the 20th century, the history of Russia was mostly a story of growth. It was reaching out in all directions.

Even during the Mongol invasion of the 13th century, the Russian princes managed by perseverance and shrewdness to study their position.

Down through the years—battles with the Ottomans, Turin, the invasion of Ukraine, the invasion of Sweden, the domination of Poland, the conquest of lands from the strengthening of the empire under Peter the Great.

Finally, Russia was knocking at the northern gates of India through the Indian Ocean, and across the sea she held the new, undeveloped states of Alaska.

But Russia strobed from the Baltic to the Pacific, a neighbor of Japan and a rival to Britain.

At home, the workers and peasant rose in the abortive revolution of 1917, along with the pairing-away of much Russian territory.

Finland, a grand duchy of the Russian empire, was declared independent in 1917. Estonia became a nation in 1918. Latvia was created, Lithuania became a republic. Poland got great reaches of White Russia and the Ukraine; new territories were joined to Rumania.

In all, Russia lost more than 1,000,000 square miles of territory. The U. S. S. R. was left with 8,539,864 square miles. But, occupied with the Communist experiment, Russia apparently gave little heed to the losses.

The times have changed. For Russia has rested, and many believe she has grown strong. With hardly more than a display of military might, she has regained much of what she lost to Poland.

While three great powers of western Europe came to grips, Russia stepped back into her old Baltic lands, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

Suggests Real War or Peace

Shaw Urges Bombing of Berlin or Gathering at Conference Table.

London, Oct. 11.—George Bernard Shaw says it's up to Prime Minister Chamberlain to declare whether he is willing to pursue war by bombing Berlin and if not, to call a peace conference to hold the better.
