



The Alexander Jarvis Co., was awarded the contract yesterday to reconstruct and strengthen the mili pond dam of the Talcott Bros. Co., at Talcottville. Work started this morning. It will involve digging a channel deep enough to drain the deep pool that has formed at the base of the dam due to erosion, reenforcing the base and replacing enforcing the base and replacing several large stones with concrete including some grading and the erection of a heavy buttress against the center of the dam. This will involve quite a bit of excavation for the foundation and will contain sufficient mass concrete to hold the old stone dam in its present position.
