Hartford, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Gov-
ernor Baldwin's probe of state high-
way fund grants of some 100 com-
munities in the last five years
was under way today.

Eight state officials were
dined with him in his office this
morning. Among them were High-
way Commissioner William J. Cox
and William E. Hulse, state aid
agent of the Highway Depart-
ment, who negotiated with small
town selectmen a Federal-state
road grant system which netted
alleged profits to towns and cities
estimated up to \$750,000.

No Progress Italian View Regard Situation on Efforts for Peace As Yet Unchanged.

Rome, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Autho-
ritative sources said today that Prime
Minister Chamberlain's reply to
Adolf Hitler's end-the-war pro-
posals represented little or no
progress in efforts for peace and
they regarded the situation as un-
changed.

There was no official reaction
to Chamberlain's speech of yes-
terday, but Italy continued to
pursue her "no initiative" policy
—both in a military sense and to-
ward any peace moves.

With prolongation of the war
likely Premier Mussolini was con-
fident with the possibility of
German pressure to obtain aid
from her neutral Axis partner,
Italy. Authoritative sources would
not comment on the possibility of
Italy's refusing such aid, whether
it be economic or military, in the
light of Mussolini's declarations
of neutrality.

Would Aid Peace Move
The opinion was general, how-
ever, that Italy would aid any
move toward European peace if a
definite basis was advanced with
reasonable possibilities for suc-
cess.

said that, to avoid any appear-
ance of initiative, Italy's new am-
bassador to London, Giuseppe
Bastianini, had gone to the British
capital with no message other
than his credentials.

Bastianini, however, would be
able to inform the British govern-
ment orally of Il Duce's wait-and-
see attitude. It was pointed out
that the powers should meet
as Hitler proposed, and settle all
outstanding quarrels around the
conference table.

Nazis Wait Neutral Response to Hitler

Berlin, Oct. 13.—(AP)—In-
formed sources reported to-
night that Germany was ex-
pecting a neutral response to
Hitler's peace proposals. It was
indicated Germany's next major
move would be taken after
these consultations, which
were understood to have
started today.

Berlin, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Authorized
Nazis today said Germany was
through with Prime Minister
Chamberlain and Premier Daladier
but still waiting for a neutral
reply to Hitler's Reichstag
speech of last Friday.

Any such action by neutral
nations—among whom they said
they regarded the United States
as the only one powerful enough
to do something effective—how-
ever, must come from them and
not as a result of any diplomatic
action or request by Germany, they
reported.

(In Washington, the lack of a
formal request for mediation was
seen as one of the obstacles to any
possible effort by the United
States government to bring peace.)

These interpretations of Ger-
many's position were made after
two developments:

1. Dr. Otto Dietrich, Germany's
press chief and one of Hitler's
closest advisers, told a small group
of foreign correspondents he
thought that only the United
States yet could intervene to pre-
vent "the most gruesome blood-
shed in history."

2. An official press release on
Chamberlain's speech yesterday
said Britain had "rejected the
hand of peace stretched out to
him by the Fuehrer" and Britain's
sims meant "war against the Ger-

TVA Vast Power System At Last Going Enterprise

Knoxville, Tenn., Oct. 13.—(AP)—
From "rags to riches" in less than
a year, the Tennessee Valley Au-
thority's vast power system is at
last a going enterprise paying its
own way. TVA Chief Power En-
gineer J. A. Krug declared today.

Within the next 12 months, the
authority anticipates revenues of
more than \$15,000,000 from the
sale of electricity at cheap "yard-
stick" rates, and the possible ex-
pansion of its system into north-
eastern Mississippi and north Ala-
bama.

"The month of September showed
TVA power operations firmly
established as a going enterprise
with the month's revenues aggre-
gating over \$1,250,000, or \$15,000-
000 on an annual basis," said
Krug, adding that "new all-time
records were established in all
phases of operations."

Revenues Will Cover Costs
This means, the youthful engi-
neer asserted, that electricity re-
venues for the current year will
cover all power costs, the common
costs allotted to power in the con-
struction of the multiple pur-

Garner Now Trying To Get Compromise On Shipping Clauses

Talk to Soviet Hope of Peace In Baltic Area

Roosevelt Says Diplo-
matic Action Not to Be
Construed in Any Way
As Pressure Move.

Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—
President Roosevelt said today
that American representations to
Soviet Russia were merely an ex-
pression of interest and hope that
nothing would be done to disturb
peaceful relations in the Baltic or
the independence of Finland.

The chief executive told a press
conference that the diplomatic
action was not to be construed in
any way as a pressure move by
the American government.

For that reason—because he did
not want any misunderstanding,
the president said, he was with-
holding for the time being the text
of the representation made at
Moscow yesterday by Ambassador
Laurence Steinhardt.

The note Steinhardt delivered
to the Soviet government would be
undoubtedly, he said, be acknowl-
edged by the Soviet government.

Nothing on Peace Bids
Asked about latest informal
peace bids from Berlin, the presi-
dent said he had nothing to say
on that. He added in response to
another question that he had re-
ceived no official word from the
German government.

(In Berlin, however, authorized
Nazis said any neutral action must
come in response to Hitler's Reich-
stag speech and not as a result of
any diplomatic action or request
from Germany.)

Mr. Roosevelt's remark that he
had nothing to say on German
peace bids came after a reporter
asked Hitler would like to see this
country settle "the European
hash" and asked whether the
president intended to do anything
about it.

Outlining the chronology of the
Russian matter, the president
said that on Monday of this week
he began to worry about the situa-
tion in the Baltic because it looked
as if it might be heading to-
ward an extension of wars.

On Tuesday, he continued, diplo-
matic representatives of several
Scandinavian nations called at the
State Department and the White
House and said they were very
much concerned. There was no
suggestion, however, of joint ac-
tion.

On Wednesday, the president
drafted a personal message to
President Kalinin of the U.S.S.R.
and waited until Secretary Hull
returned to the city hat at-
ternoon, when they edited it.

The message, Mr. Roosevelt
said, was sent to the Soviet
government and the three Scandi-
navian countries.

Harding Saves British Crew Makes Rescues While Proceeding to Aid of Tanker Found Ablaze.

New York, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The
American liner President Hard-
ing today said that she had
rescued the crew of 36 of the
British freighter Heronpool while
proceeding to aid the attacked
French tanker W. Emile Miguet.
The Heronpool was sunk off the
Irish coast. The Harding said it
found the tanker in flames. The
crew apparently had drowned.

Capt. James E. Roberts sent the
following message to the United
States Lines in New York:
No Sign of Crew on Tanker.
"At 2:10 p. m. (New York time)
Thursday responded to SOS from
French tanker W. Emile Miguet in
latitude 50.08 north longitude 14
west. At 1:50 a. m. sighted and
rescued crew of 36 in boat from
British steamer Heronpool. None
missing. Reached W. Emile Miguet
at 3:30 a. m. No sign of crew.
Proceeded at 9:37 a. m."

The Harding left Le Verdon Oct.
11 for New York with 597 passen-
gers aboard.
The Emile Miguet left Corpus
Christi, Texas, Sept. 17 with 136-
087 barrels of crude oil. Her ton-
nage of 14,115 made her one of
the largest oil tankers afloat. She
was presumably bound for Le
Havre.

No Details Given.
London, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The
British Admiralty reported today
a submarine attack on the steamer
Heronpool and the rescue of the
crew by an American ship, but
gave no details as to when or
where the 3,200-ton British vessel
was attacked, the release.

Finns Ordered Ready to Act To Aid Nation

Helsinki, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Presi-
dent Kyyosti Kallio issued a de-
cree today ordering all Finnish
citizens to hold themselves in
readiness to aid the government in
non-military pursuits if required
by the present emergency.

The decree was issued as Fin-
nish leaders continued to express
optimism concerning their chances
of receiving acceptable terms
from Soviet Russia in the second
day of Finnish-Russian talks be-
gan in Moscow. They hope their
country would fare better than
Baltic neighbors which have be-
come virtual Russian protector-
ates as a result of Kremlin par-
leys.

The decree put into effect regu-
lations previously drawn provid-
ing for wartime emergency. The
services of all citizens may be re-
quired for work applied directly
or indirectly in connection with
national defense.

Steps up Preparations
The nation stepped up prepara-
tions to fight, if necessary, for its
independence in keeping with the
foreign minister's declaration that
Finland would resist dictation.

Finns anxiously awaited results
of the second day's conversation
in Moscow between the Kremlin
and the Finnish delegation.

Nations Fear Soviet Moves

Copenhagen, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The
apprehensions of neutral Scandi-
navian countries were reflected today
in their newspaper and official utterances.

Concern centered on the Finnish-
Soviet Russian talks at Moscow
and the proximity of war in west-
ern Europe which already has
severely blighted Scandinavian
shipping.

Newspaper reports of opinions
in Moscow political circles as to
the proposals Russia was laying
before the Finnish delegation out-
lined them as follows:

1.—That Finland hand over
small islands on the route of the
Russian Navy through the Gulf of
Finland into the Baltic.

2.—That Finland enter a mili-
tary assistance pact involving no
territorial occupation of Finnish ter-
ritory.

3.—That Finland agree to tight-
en economic and political bonds
with Russia.

4.—That Finland expel German,
Swedish, Norwegian and Danish
presently identical notes to the
pressing "expectations that north-
ing will occur which would pre-
vent Finland from continuing in-
dependently to maintain her neu-
tral position, which she maintains
with other northern countries, and
with the negotiations to cement
friendly relations between Finland
and Soviet Russia."

Premier Per Albin Hansson of
Sweden declared last night in a
restatement of his country's posi-
tion that he was sure she could
keep out of the war. He warned
that expressions of individual
constructing as endangering Swedish
neutrality would not be tolerated.
His audience was the union of
Swedish workers.

Swedish official circles greeted
with gratitude the interest shown
by the United States in Finland's
position. The United States am-
bassador to Moscow yesterday
made representations similar to
those of Sweden, Norway and Den-
mark.

The Swedes said Washington
thus had helped secure the safety
of northern states and this, they
said, the people will never forget.

Eyes Examined Glasses Fitted

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Army Shows Fire Power Of Its Anti-Aircraft Gun

Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., Oct. 11 (AP)—The Army has demonstrated publicly for the first time the fire power of its electrically aimed anti-aircraft gun. The gun, which is a modification of the 90 mm. anti-aircraft gun, was fired at an altitude of 10,000 feet, before an audience composed of Army Ordnance and aviation members were centered around the gun.
