





The Falklands were first settled by the French in 1764, later sold to Spain. Argentina inheroccupied with internal affairs, paid small attention to the islands. In 1831 an American sloop dis-lodged pirates who had used the islands as a base, and in 1833 United States turned the Falk-lands over to Britain. During the World War, Admiral von Spee attempted to seize the Falklands for Germany, but the British destroyed his fleet. The artist has indicated the posmall cross on the Argentina stamp, above, showing a map of the republic. The original stamp does not show the islands.
