Instructed to patrol "vigorously," the Royal Italian Consul General, Count Galeazzo Ciano, yesterday called the attention of the British chargé d'affaires and the British ambassador to possible consequences which the extended blockade might have on Italian fishermen.

Beat Senseless Wastage
Next Tuesday, because fewer than seventy persons so willed it, eleven thousand Manchester voters are summoned to the polls.

The call for the polling, conforming to the petition, sets its purpose as: "To see if the town will vote to establish four voting districts in the town of Manchester."

Well, suppose the town should vote yes—what then? Do you, Mr. Voter or Mrs. or Miss Voter, know what then? Of course not. No map or chart of proposed districts has been submitted to you; no boundaries have been suggested by the petitioners. You are asked to vote on a question which, on one side, has no shape, no outline whatever.

"Four voting districts" might mean anything. It might mean one great central district covering a considerable radius from the Army, with three little districts for the outlying sections. It might mean four districts based on equal division of territory. It might mean four based on population.

You are asked to vote on the question without possibility of knowing what might be the district set-up consequent upon a "yes" vote.

The only result that can be visualized would be the result of a "no" vote. That would be definite. It would mean that the town would remain a single voting district, as it now is; at least until some intelligible and definite redistricting plan is developed at some time in the future when its need has been demonstrated.

You can not possibly know what you are voting for if you vote "yes."

You can vote "no" with complete understanding of your vote's purpose.

We are very little interested in the so-called political purposes of this maneuver. It is impossible to believe that a four-district division of the town could be of any particular partisan effect, one way or another. But we are very much interested in and distressed by utterly futile wastage of taxpayer money that comes out of the pockets of Manchester's taxpayers.
