Zoning Regulations
 Because zoning laws and their administration constitute an important problem for many communities, particularly where these things are relatively new, the small crisis in the Hartford Zoning Board of Appeals will be watched with considerable interest outside the Capital City.

Last Year Democratic Mayor Spillacy named to the board a Republican real estate man, an associate of the mayor's predecessor in office. Now this new member of the board resigns, giving the Republican real estate man a "protest against the way in which the affairs of the commission are conducted," but making no specific charges. He says that he will see the mayor in person and explain his reasons for dissatisfaction. To a newspaper the resigning member said that "my general feeling is that the various applications, appeals, etc., to the board are not entirely decided on their merits and that other considerations are allowed to creep in."

Others than the resigning Hartford zoning functionary have a "general feeling" about the workings of zoning and zoning boards. It is that the whole zoning enterprise has been, from the start, over-built and over-machined. That the job, instead of being as simple as possible, has been made too complicated, too detailed, too fine-drawn.

The original purpose of zoning advocates was to keep plainly unsuitable implantations from intruding into specified neighborhoods—unsightly shacks from being erected in residential neighborhoods, amoky or smelly industrial establishments from forcing their way into retail areas, obnoxious structures from encroaching on property by their owners.

If zoning boards confined their activities to such protection, there would be little complaint. But they do not and perhaps, under the state law, cannot very well do so. There are too many gradations of what is objectionable, too many subtle distinctions between them. Pretty soon we may have zoning boards telling property owners that on this street only white houses will be permitted and on that one only brown ones with tar.

Zoning, kept within its limitations and with distinctions so obvious that they can hardly be open to argument, is a very fine thing indeed. But zoning that results in such imperfections as an extent that it must, that begins, set up a system of appeals from its own findings, becomes a matter of splitting hairs. And where hairs are to be split it is inevitable that, as this resigning Hartford official declares, "other considerations" shall creep in. In other words, what should be a very plain and understandable public service becomes a source of bureaucracy, of favoritism—of worse.

In this matter of zoning most Connecticut communities that have gone for it at all appear to have gotten off on the wrong foot. They are trying to do too much and have established petty little tyrannies. Family municipalities where they intended to adapt merely sane and decent regulations.

The German Bases
 If the immediate purpose of the German, in their way of marine endeavor, is to terrorize the owners and crews of neutral ships into keeping away from British ports, indications certainly point to being completely successful, at least for a time. Announcement by the Belgian Ministry of Marine that the ship service between Ostend and Dover has been cancelled is an indication of how thoroughly the German mine and submarine campaign has impressed itself upon the minds of Europe. One city of Belgium has been captured in the name of one of the white "angels" of the celestial company. Commanding features of the ornate port, the greatest avenue, and the Channel service is practically that of a ferry, it being an extremely important means of communication between England and continental Europe. To close it down is a matter of much gravity.

Instructions Issued For Postal Packages

Postmaster Quish Announces Regulations Applicable to Various European Countries.

Instructions for the mailing of international parcel post packages for arrival in the designated countries before Christmas, has been received in the local postoffice by Postmaster Thomas J. Quish. Every effort is being made this year to have international parcel packages properly prepared and in fact a number that packages should be packed in canvas or similar material, wrapping paper or waterproof paper, lined with linen gauze, double faced corrugated cardboard boxes, solid fiber boxes or strong, wooden boxes made of material at least a half inch thick. Boxes with lids screwed or nailed on and secured by sewing may also be used if they conform to the other conditions prescribed.

Wooden Boxes

The ordinary regulation containers are totally inadequate for this purpose, the regulations state. Articles of china, crockery, glass, balsa, rubber or other articles of fragile or breakable nature should be packed in strong preferably wooden boxes. Strong double faced corrugated boxes are preferred enclosed in wooden boxes, especially in the case of overseas destinations.

It is recommended that a space of one and one half inches be kept between the inner and outer boxes for packing cushioning material on the two boxes, sides, bottom and top.

If a package, in the opinion of the accepting post office, is not adequately packed, it shall be refused.
