





Connecticut to Have Gay, **Bountiful Christmas Time**

New Haven, Dec. 2—(3)— Cone necticut will have the gayest, most bountiful Christmas in several years this season if Christmas club disbursements recently made by the banks of the state are any indication.

A compliation by the Associated Press shows that in the state's 21 largest communities, 198,209 depositors received a total of \$8.520,211 in savings. With the figures from the remote, smalltown banks added it is reasonable to suppose that more than \$10,000,000 will be circulated in the state during the Yule season.

In the state at large, the average club member has withdrawn about \$42,86 to be used to defrave the cost of Santa Claus' visit or for a Christmas vacation, or, possibly, to meet pressing bills.

Biggest Amount in Bridgeport.

Residents of Bridgeport showed more forethought in preparing for the holidays than did those in any of the other communities. In that city, 38,000 persons saved \$2,100,000. In Hartford, 34,195 perons withdrew \$1,427,000, while \$1,161,000 was distributed among 34,900 persons in New Haven.

Source Danbury folk, however, appear ed to bave more money to lay away for Christmas than anyone else. The average Christmas club member in that city saved \$55.73.

Bridgeport people were almost as thrifty, saving an average of \$55.26 per person.






