The present governor of the state, John W. Bricker, is a bitter individual. He is against all forms of federal and state relief, a convinced believer in the idea of local communities to look after their own problems. He has refused to call the legislature in special session to raise the relief funds by new taxation, let alone devoting part of the state's large and increasing revenue to the relief of the cities' destitute.

That is the situation faced by several of the busiest and most prosperous industrial communities in the country. It is a very dangerous one.
