## Will Recruit Here for CNG

### Friday and Saturday Officers at Army to Hold Interviews.

The Connecticut National Guard will recruit new members in Manchester on Friday and Saturday of this week, December 8 and 9. A special recruiting office will be established in the Army for those two days. The office will be under the direction of Captain R. E. Hagedorn. The recent expansion program ordered by the War Department has made a number of vacancies in the National Guard. Due to this increase in personnel excellent opportunities for promotion are offered. Recruits must be between the ages of 18 and 45, citizens of the United States, unmarried, and physically fit. Captain Hagedorn is Commander of the Regimental Headquarters Company and is especially anxious to get young men who are interested in radio for there are many openings in the Headquarters Company for radio operators and a good opportunity for those interested in radio to learn more about it. Training is offered in motor transportation, mechanized scout cars, tanks, communications by telephone in the field, rifle marksmanship, musketry and machine gun. Captains Hagedorn's points out that all uniforms and equipment are furnished by the Federal Government and that members of the National Guard are paid for the regular drills.

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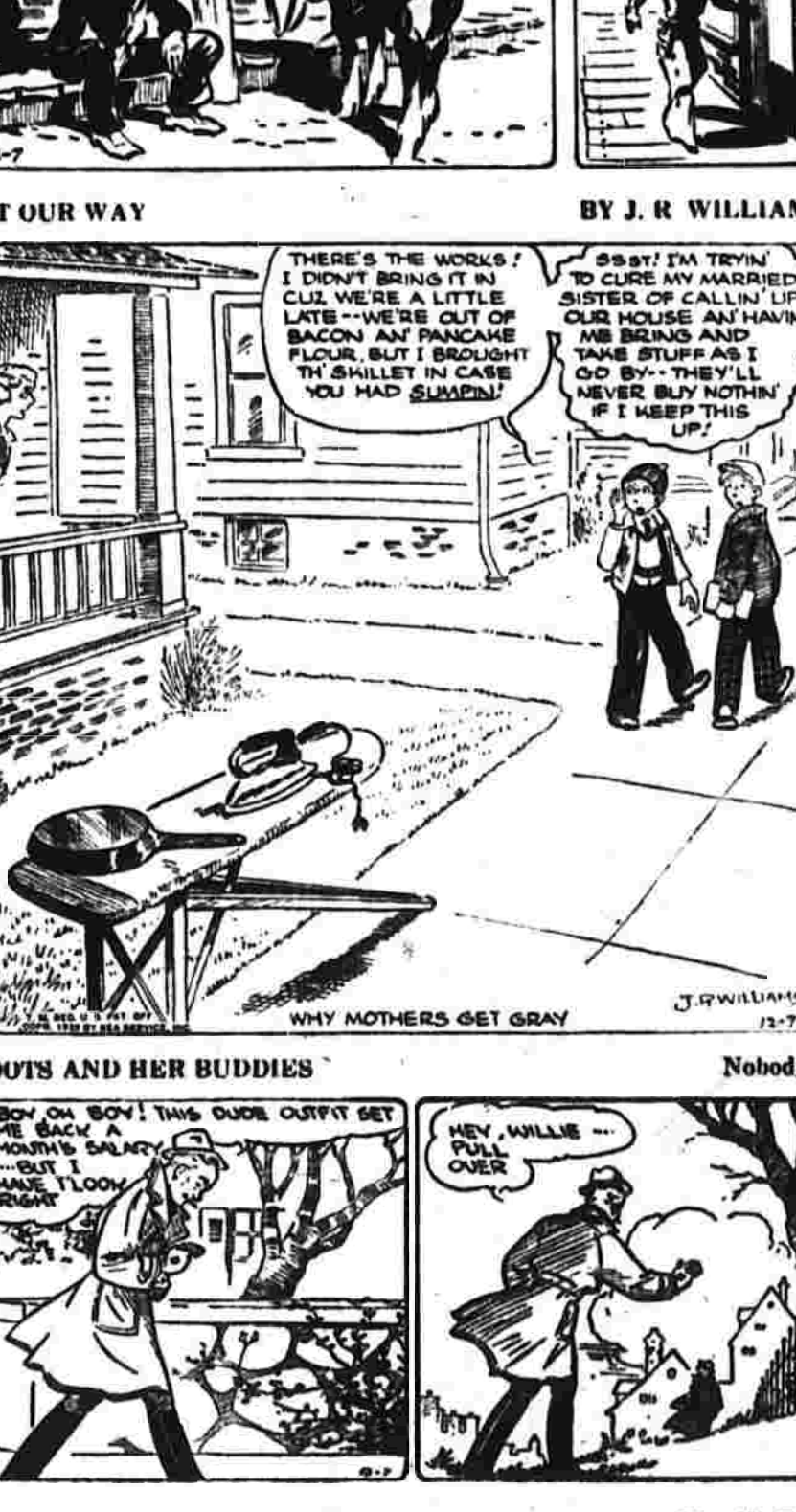
