### Chinese Dislike Bank Methods

#### Japanese Build Up Foreign Balance of Nearly \$8,000,000.

Peking, (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Starting with no assets, the Japanese-controlled Reserve Bank has built up a foreign balance of nearly \$8,000,000 in terms of United States money in less than two years and has gained nearly complete control of currency circulation in the Japanese-occupied areas of North China.

This striking financial success has been achieved with the vigorous support of the Japanese Army by methods which Chinese bitterly condemn.

The formula was both simple and effective. To ignore the fact that the silver brought to the Japanese Army began trading in the country's currency, the Japanese government nominally based against 50,000,000 Chinese dollars, and silver on the market of British and French concessions in Tientsin and still there—with the Japanese demanding it.

Chinese were forced at gunpoint in many cases to accept the new notes in exchange for currency of the Nationalist Government (Kai-Shek) government which is freely convertible into foreign currency.
