Concedes Conduct At Hearing Shows Separation Laxity

Phillips Sees NLRB Records Introduced to Prove That While He Was Acting as Attorney He Also Instructed Trial Examiner.

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A regional director of the National Labor Relations Board conceded today that his own conduct at a trial examiner's hearing showed a lack of proper separation of the board's judicial and prosecuting functions in the Cincinnati Milling Machine company case.

Appearing before the House committee investigating the Labor Board, Phillip G. Phillips, regional director at Cincinnati, saw NLRB records introduced which showed that while he was acting as attorney at the hearing he was also instructing the trial examiner, Harold Hurley, in instructions from the board.

"The upheld Phillips' contention on the point covered by the instructions, the evidence brought out, and the case subsequently was dropped because of Phillips' conduct at the hearing," Phillips testified.

Acting in Two Capacities Rep. Hallett (R., Ind.), told the witness that "apparently the case was one of the cases where you were acting as a prosecutor in the Washington and making suggestions about what the actions of the trial examiner should be."

"To you think," Hallett inquired, "that indicated a fair divorce of the prosecuting function from the judicial?"

"No, I don't think it would," Phillips replied.

Questioning brought from the witness testimony that Phillips had transmitted to Hurley concerned the board's rules on admissibility of evidence, the witness said he acted at the direction of Nathan Witt, NLRB secretary.

Subsequent to his giving Hurley the instructions, Phillips testified, testimony that one of the witnesses discharged and engaged in Communist activities was ruled inadmissible by Hurley. Phillips testified that he had objected to this testimony, who objected to this testimony.

Pugilist Held As Murderer Of Engelberg

Haas Confesses He Beat Secretary of German Consulate to Death in His Home at Brooklyn

New York, Dec. 18.—(AP)—John J. Ryan, assistant chief police inspector, announced today that he had arrested a pugilist, had been arrested in Toronto, Canada, for the killing of Dr. Walter Engelberg, secretary of the German consulate here.

Ryan said Haas acknowledged he had beaten Engelberg to death in his Brooklyn home on Dec. 5. Haas's statement, Ryan said, was made to Capt. Frank Bala, Brooklyn detective.

Woman Led To Arrest A woman, Ryan said, unwittingly led the police to Haas. Dr. Engelberg's body was found 24 hours after the slaying, by an official of the consulate. He was taken to the Brooklyn home to see why Dr. Engelberg had not reported for work on two successive days.

The employee, Fred Doell, found the back door open. Captain Bala came upon Dr. Engelberg's body, garbed in white nightgown, stretched on a bed. The victim's hands were cold; his head had been crushed.

Bloody Fight, Wife Said Numerous bloody fingerprints, a pair of size 11 shoe slippers and a pair of size 11 socks, one of which had been found in the home of Dr. Engelberg, who was a German university graduate and a lecturer at the consulate, were found at the scene. The police had been in the house for an investigation of an entertaining man at the house.

The German government shortly announced that it was conducting an investigation of the case.

Uruguay May Hold German Supply Ship

Montevideo, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The Uruguayan government today took a step toward internment of the German supply ship Tacoma, which carried oil supplies intended for the ill-fated battleship Admiral Graf Spee before a battle with three British cruisers sent her to her doom.

Government vessels escorted the Tacoma from an outer harbor and channeled her into the inner basin where two narrow breakwaters and under the guns of a Uruguayan warship to reach the sea.

Chinese Drive Not General

Units in Coordinated Attack on Bases and Lines Of Japanese Army.

Hongkong, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A Chinese Army spokesman declared today units harassing the Japanese in Honan province were fighting the Japanese garrison in streets of the provincial capital, Kaifeng.

The action, he said, was part of a widespread, coordinated attack on Japanese bases and communication lines during a Japanese troop replacement program, but was not a general drive.

The Chinese said Army units had destroyed Japanese supplies and bridges and roads from Hsiao-chow, on the eastern coast, to the city of Shanghai, to the vicinity of the Yangtze river, and close approach to Yochow, all held for months by the Japanese.

Eligible on "Open Door" Tokyo, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Official circles watching the progress of negotiations with the United States for a new trade treaty expressed belief today they would cling on American insistence for an "open door" policy in China—rather than a reopening of the Yangtze to three-power commerce. Observers pointed out the actual Chinese losses should be handled by public bidding or private negotiation.

Berlin, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The great battle between British and German warplanes over German Bay (Heligoland Bight) yesterday was the biggest air fight in history, the German official news agency DNB said today.

The German high command, repeating what they made their way of low-flying planes, British claimed the activity with the laying of magnetic mines by Germany.

Echoes Gibe of Churchill Press and public echoed the gibe of Winston Churchill, first lord of the Admiralty, that German warships rarely venture forth and then "only for future death."

The Admiralty made public an eyewitness account of the fight of British warships against the Graf Spee of South America.

British losses were raised from 34 to 36 by DNB, which said it was established an additional bomber had been shot down and another plane had made an emergency landing.

The British Air Ministry said that only seven British planes were missing, and that 12 German planes had been shot down. Authorities British sources agreed, however, with earlier German statements that the battle was the biggest air clash of the present war.

Only Two Comparable In asserting that the battle was the greatest of all time, DNB said that only two previous encounters—both in the World War, were more comparable.

These, DNB said, were at Le Cateau, August 23, 1918, when British fighters shot down 17 German planes, and at Cantons, France, on Oct. 9, 1918, when air squadrons fought in closed formation, clashing in each.

At Le Cateau, said DNB, 40 British planes tried to break through German lines to reconnoiter the German positions, led by Germany's greatest World War ace, Baron von Richtofen, who was shot down and killed.

She and Kipling were married in 1882 in London, but returned to Vermont for a honeymoon and remained there until Kipling wrote some of his most famous works.

Mrs. Kipling, who had been ill for an extended time, would have been 74 Dec. 31.

The American-born woman met the writer in 1880, when he was collaborating with her brother, Wolcott Balestier, on "The Nautilus." They were married two years later.

Mrs. Kipling died at the Bateau, Burwash, home where she had lived for many years.

Warn All Against Open Flames Near Trees and Curtains; Inspect Electrical Outlets.

With the start of Christmas trees in Manchester greater than usual this year warning is issued by Chief Foy of the south Manchester fire department and Chief Foy of the Manchester department on the necessity of care in preventing fire.

Chief Foy warning to the need of proper inspection of buildings where trees are erected in stores and public structures in stores where packing materials and rubbish gather more rapidly during the Christmas season than at any other time of the year.


