Cowles Hotel Block Is Gutted by Fire

Depot Square Landmark Ruined in Blaze Early Today; Firemen Do Good Work Saving Adjacent Buildings; Estimate Loss \$25,000

The Cowles Hotel block on the north side of Depot Square was gutted by fire this morning that for a time threatened the entire business section at the North end. The interior of the building, that part which was the original hotel, was destroyed. The four stores that fronted on North Main street were damaged by water and

The estimated damage of the blaze was \$25,000. The property is owned by the Savings Bank of lockville and is covered by insur-

The fire for a time threatened to spread to adjoining buildings and five pumper lines of water were turned into the fire for the better part of an hour. A sixth line was connected at 6:50, there having been five lines in use from shortly after sounding of the alarm at 5:43 until further aid was given by the arrival of one of the pumps from the South Manchester department and No. 4's hook and ladder truck, also from the South end.

Fire Discovered. Shortly after 5 o'clock this morning the few people who were in the vicinity of Depot Square detected a heavy smoke odor, but there appeared to be no blaze. It was not until Frank A. Nickerson, local agent of the Railway Express Agency, which is located across the Square from the hotel. sought the square from the notel, sought the cause of the smell of smoke. Looking across the Square he could see fire reflecting from the old hotel's upper wintiows. He turned in the alarm from Station No. 12 which is the call for fire at North Main and North School streets. This brings out both pumps of the Manchester department. The larger of the two pumps connected with the hydrant at the intersection of North Main and Main streets and three lines of hose were connected. The new booster pump of the de-partment connected with the hy-drant at North Main and North

Victor Morelli, the manager, estimated the loss at \$50,000, evenly divided between damage to equip-ment and interior furnishings and
