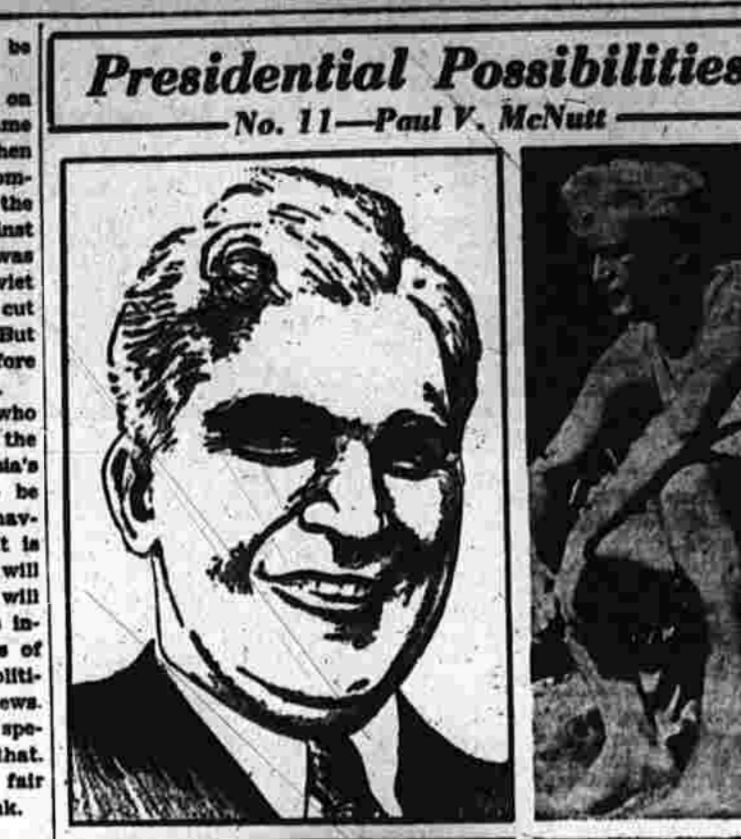

St. John's Retain Challenge to Debutantes
Y Court Lead Issued by Boston Models

Trim Highland Park by 58-14; Eagles Troupe North Ends

Boston, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Determined to eliminate debutante competition, Boston professional models issued a challenge for a struggle of glamour today in their fight against society models.

They need only 50 in their group to be considered professional outfit, and they have nearly 100, many of whom will be enrolled as the battle progresses.

Should they achieve their goal, they would be classified as a professional group and their activities would be under state supervision with all models registered as members of the profession.

World Wrap-Up Menace

That they contend, would wrap up the debutante menace. The petition sought to have the Legislature bar amateurs and all-time amateurs from the profession, or if they were to be admitted, they would require a certain amount of study and training.

Several debutantes who have become professional models in the past few months have been dropping out of the ranks, and some have gone to work for professional models. This is a sign, they claim, that the amateur model is being eliminated.

The models have drawn up petitions in the past few days throughout the state, asking Gov. Allen to sign a law that will give them the right to join the models in their fight against the amateur competition.

Insects May Invade Even Clean Households

(This is another in a series of household pest articles written by the Associated Press by a former domestic source of information who says that he has written a book on the subject.)

New Haven, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Whether or not we like to discuss the subject of bedbugs, there is a growing fear that these annoying pests may appear in any household, however clean, says Neely Turner, executive director of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station.

Turner finds many of the time honored control measures dangerous for general use. These include spraying or otherwise treating wall cracks and furniture with gasolines; the use of bicarbonate of soda; and the use of mercury solution, and kerosene.

There is a distinct fire hazard connected with the gasoline method, while the use of poisonous substances should not be handled by the layman, and kerosene is inflammable and has a lingering odor.

How to Fight Pests

The development of ordinary commercial fly sprays has been a boon to the housewife in her fight against house flies. As soon as the insecticide is applied, the flies die, and the housewife can breathe again. Upon application of the insecticide, the flies die, and the housewife can breathe again.

Since bedbugs have no wings, they cannot be driven from one place to another. Favorite places of transportation are the cracks and crevices of the house, where they hide away from light. They are often found in the folds of curtains, under the mattress, and in the folds of bedclothes.
