Unions in Politics

Among a number of amendments to the Wagner Act which probably will be proposed to the present session of Congress is one which would prohibit the use of labor union funds in political campaigns.

The motives behind this proposal may have considerable justification in some respects. It is not altogether comfortable to contemplate the possibility that a single individual perhaps, exercising an influence amounting to one-man control over a great national labor organization, might at any time not only throw the scales of justice to elect or defeat a candidate for the Presidency of the United States; or that Congressmen might be elected or defeated through the contributions as well as the votes of labor divisions of such an organization.

But there is an entirely different viewpoint from which this question might be considered. It is doubtful if there is any other public question on which quite so many Americans are agreed as in the belief that the institution of the workers' strike is about the most unsatisfactory and most injurious instrument that has ever been employed in an attempt to bring about sociological readjustments. Yet for many years it was regarded in this country by both the rank and file of wage workers and their leaders, as the only real weapon of defense in the hands of labor.

It is only comparatively recently that labor unions have turned toward the belief that in a democracy, where all under the Constitution are politically equal, they have been long neglecting a far more potent instrument than the strike—the use of the ballot for the betterment of their members' conditions.

There must be many thoughtful people, not in any way associated with organized labor, who if offered the choice of having labor unions devote their efforts to political action or having them instead conduct an endless war of strikes, would very gladly accept the former alternative. We think the vast majority of employees would be among them. Certainly it would seem as though Congress and the state legislatures were better placed for the breaking out of the respective claims of workers and employers than the halting production line or embattled streets—ballots and campaign contributions more reasonable weapons than sit-down strikes and lockouts.

To sure no such sharply defined alternatives present themselves at the moment. But a trend in that direction does exist. If the unions ever become thoroughly convinced that the strike as a political weapon is as good and that politics provides real opportunity for labor to improve its status, it would seem inevitable that the unions must soon thereafter have a great many fewer strikes and a great deal more of politics in the labor movement.

This is the approach to the proposed amendment that strikes so much forcibly. We believe it to be very little to the interest of either employers or the public to erect obstacles in the way of labor union abandonment of the crude, ruinous and ugly strike in favor of the more civilized and more effective recourse of unarmament political action.

Mark Twain Attack

The dispute over whether or not Mark Twain should be included in the "first sale" of the Mark Twain statue, has had the singular effect of giving a badly unneeded boost to Missouri Congressman Shannon's campaign for a chance to show off in a distribute district at the memory of the famous humorist. Representative Joseph B. Shannon of Kansas City made a speech in the House in which he attacked Mark Twain for having deserted from the Confederate army after "about four months of service" in a fight between Missouri troops and Federal Missouri troops, and of having become a sympathizer with and associate of Northern reconstructionists after the war.

A Flood of Dead

1,100 American Warplanes Already Delivered to Allies
