100 Persons Employed

Sorting begins in the local warehouse each year about the middle of October and continues until the latter part of February, During this time about 100 women and men are employed in the various operations of tobacco culture.

The Wetstone-Kamins Company grows shade-grown tobacco exclusivey. This type of tobacco is grown especially for cigar wrappers, the texture of the leaf being more adaptable to this use and the quality of the tobacco is better for having been grown in partial shade under cloth.

Is Closely Inspected

In the sorting room there is one above the inspector for each five girls and above the inspector for each grade.

Due to such factors as texture, elasticity, veins and coloring, which affect the grading of the leaves, all leaves are inspected after they are sorted and it takes years of experience to become moderately accurate in grading good tobacco.







Frequently what is known to medicine as "bronchiectasis" is mis-diagnosed as bronchitis.

In health, the sir-cells of the bronchial tubes are lined with little hair-like "cilia" that automatically remove the secretions. In certain diseases, these sir-cells lose their elasticity and become dilated. Secretions accumulate and decompose, and are dislodged only by fits of coughing, that last until the cells are cleared and the patient eased, then they again become filled. Drainage must be established and infection relieved before the trouble will clear. Sometimes a vaccine, made especially for the individual, will cure. Another condition sometimes called "bronchitis", is a weakened heart muscle causing a "wet lung" and a consequent cough. Especially in elderly people, serum leaks into the pircells, from poor and slow circulation of blood through the lungs. Rest, heart tonics and an intelligent search for the cause, is the way to cure this type of so-called "bronchitis" irritation from pollen, and other things causing hay fever and asthma, may sometimes cause an irritation diagnosed as "bronchitis", and may be cleared up by finding the offending irritant and treating accordingly.

People sometimes have "bronchitis" caused by a slow-moving tuberculosis, and go about with a "hacking" cough. They constantly endanger the lives of others through contagion and their own lives by deleying correct diagnoses and treatment for the real cause. Let your doctor help to locate and cure it.




