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Start on New Bridge Expected by May 1st

Preliminary Test Surveys Begin; See Five Cent Toll Now Await Final Authorization.

After showing how the need for the new span is acute one from the state highway commission, the state highway department has approved the plan for the bridge.

From the direction of New Haven, it is planned to have cars enter Hartford as now via Maple avenue, from Middle-town via the Silas Deane highway, both of which would be closed to approach the new bridge on a route parallel with the Valley line railroad tracks near the southern Hartford limit. The bridge itself some 85 feet above the river, will extend from the end of Silver line westward across the river, about 300 feet south of the present crossing of an electric transmission line, marked by steel towers.

As the traffic from New Haven or other southern points reaches the western end of the bridge, a "clover-leaf" will enable it to cross the span or go on to Hartford. All exits and entrances to the bridge are planned so that the bridge will have to halt for only a few moments.

At the eastern, or our side of the bridge, the "clover-leaf" allowing traffic to move eastward to Hartford, or north and south to Springfield, New London.

For local commuters, the route into Hartford includes the bridge and the road to the center of the city. It is further planned to construct a highway "cut" right through the center of Hartford. Such a road will be the primary purpose of the bridge, and will be a great convenience to the city.

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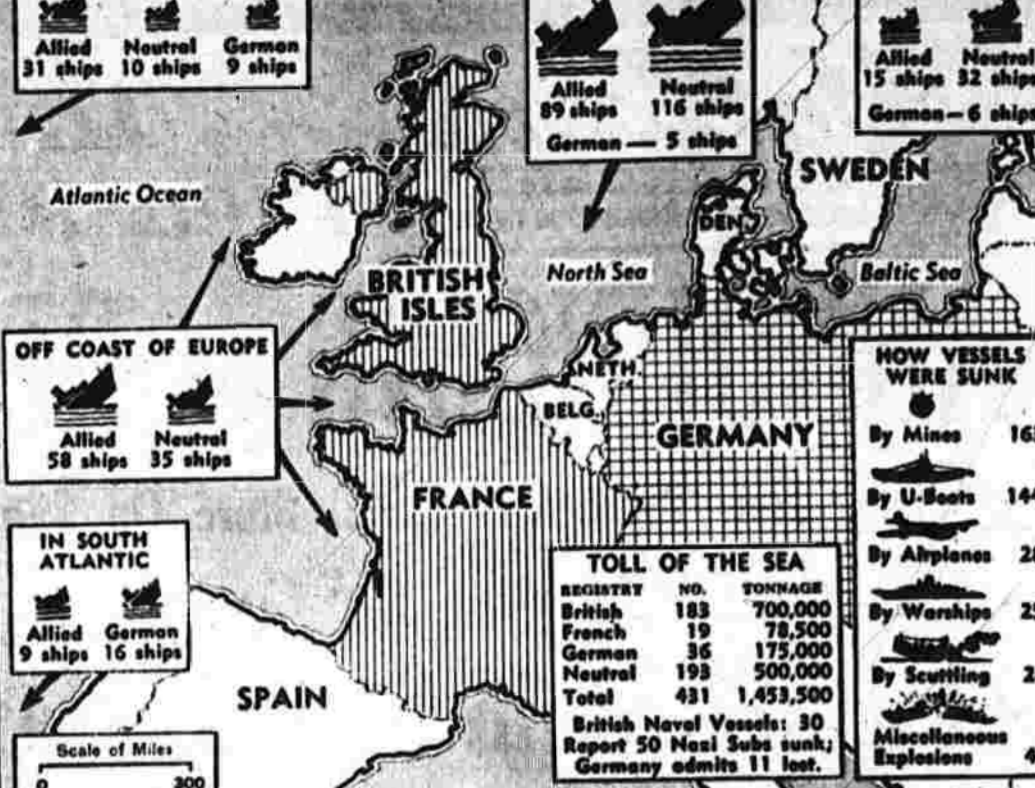
