Wire Tapping To Be Halted

Jackson Decides to Apply Ban to All Federal Investigators.

Washington, March 18.—(AP)—The order went out to G. M. Clegg today that wire tapping "will not be tolerated."

Attorney General Jackson decided to apply the ban to all Federal investigators, through a further order to Federal attorneys that no case should be prosecuted in which it appears that the case has been developed in whole or in part as the result of wire tapping after April 1.

The new order, which placed "listening in" to telephone calls among "unethical tactics," brings Justice Department rules into line with recent decisions of the Supreme Court, Jackson pointed out.

Hamburg (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—This ancient Hanseatic city, Germany's largest port, continues to be an international harbor despite the war.

To make up for the loss of trans-oceanic trade it attempts to step up shipments to Latvia, Belgium, Denmark, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Holland, Estonia and Russia.

It also keeps up a brisk domestic service with Bremen, Oldenburg, Emden and other ports on the North Sea, Danzig, Gdynia, Gotenhafen (formerly Riga), Koenigsberg, Rumburg, Rostock, Stettin, Stralsund and a few other ports on the Baltic and with all the industrial centers along the Rhine, Main, Neckar and Moselle rivers.

For the confidential use of prospective shippers, the Hamburg Free Harbor Shipping Company circulates a monthly shipping list of freighters.

The director of the Hamburg harbor, an eccentric young man named Ernest Platze, has decided to assure the Baltic and other shippers in the Balkans and the Mediterranean.
