Thirty years later, competitors of 45 nations were entered in the Paris games, and, in 1936, there were 56 countries represented at Berlin.

Coubertin refused many honors for his work, was content to serve as president of the Olympics until 1924, when he asked to be retired. He died in Switzerland in 1937.
