Belgium To Compeigne The dimpled little Frenchman who saved Warsaw—and who now commands France's expanding forces in the Near East, where 1940 may see him again fighting Reds— was born Jan. 21, 1867, in Brus-

sels, Belgium. At the French West Point, St Cyr, he was registered as a "stu-dent of foreign nationality." He became a citizen of France at 20, and in 1888 enlisted in the French army as a second-lieutenant o

A lieutenant-colonel when the World War began, Weygand was Immediately promoted to colonel and assigned to the general staff. In 1916, as a brigadier-general, he was appointed Foch's chief-of-staff. From then on, the two were

staff. From then on, the two were seldom separated.

"Foch's shadow," other French officers called Weygand. "See Weygand about that" became a byword at headquarters.

When Foch became commander-in-chief of the Allied armies, in the dark Spring of the war's last year, Weygand continued as his right - hand man. In Compeigne Forest, at dawn on Nov. 11, 1918, they sat elbow-to-elbow in the rallway car where a disheartened

counted one of the best soldiers his country ever had, was named commander-in-chief of French forces in the Near East.

His army there is estimated at 275,000 men. Britain is believed to have at least 100,000 troops in the neighborhood, Turkey upward of 200,000. If the Allies attack Russia and/or Germany from the south, or are summoned to the rescue of Turkey or the Balkans, Gen. Weygand, hale and foxy at 73, may command all three forces.

Disobedience Delayed

The postman's cart, pictured on the stamp above, was a familiar sight on city streets and rural routes in 1912, when the stamp was issued, one of a set of 12 designated for parcel post. Although the automobile has practically supplanted the horse in mail delivery, the 1939 Postoffice Department report lists 30 horse-drawn vehicles under contract for city delivery. No data on the number of horses used in rural delivery were available.

Rural free delivery service has grown from three routes, in 1896, to 32,839 routes, employing 32,761 carriers who cover 421,854,497 miles annually to serve 25,000,000 patrons. The service costs about 20 cents a mile.
