The Unmentioned Way Out
When, in an election year, Congress goes on a spending spree, it is quite customary for commentators to dismiss the matter with a few farcical reflections about "the boys" yielding to the political necessities of the situation and to the appetites of their constituents back home. But with the nation confronted by an appalling and constantly growing public debt, it would seem that something more than casual eulogy from the House of Representatives passes a labor-social security appropriation measure calling for sixty-five millions more than recommended by its own Appropriations Committee and fifty-million more than asked for by the President's lavish budget. It naturally suggests the question, Where do these people expect the country to get to?

Pin Money Patronage
This newspaper can hardly be accused of partisan bias in its attitude toward the census, since we have consistently criticized the campaign obstructing a referendum against certain of its features by Senator Lodge of New Hampshire and a large section of the press. But if the appointment of enumerators has been along the same lines throughout the country as it has been for this area we question if it is a perfectly fair selection of the best people for the job. In the past, it has been common to employ those whose husbands are gainfully employed.

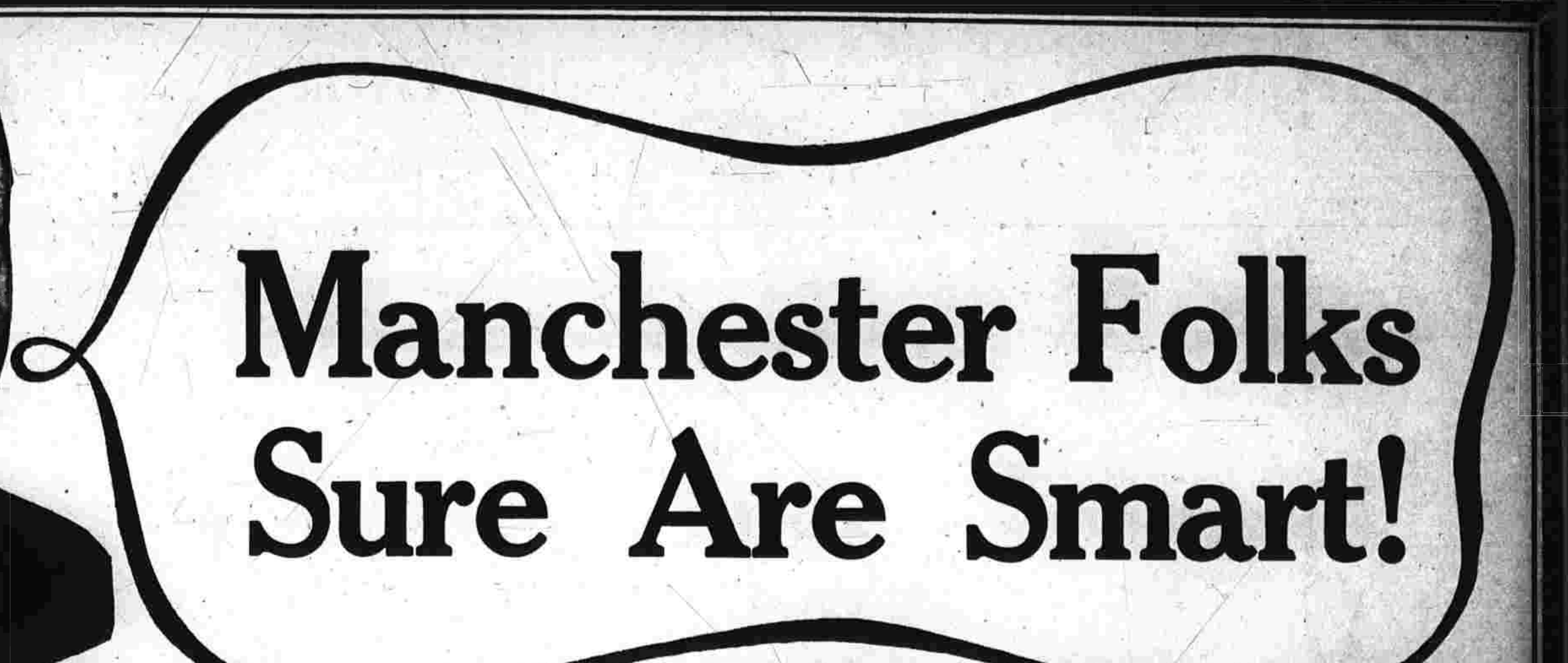

Milky Way's Vacant Space Filled with Atoms, Dust

San Francisco, March 30.—(AP)—Substances, sodium, calcium, potassium and titanium have been identified in the cloud. They are present as separate atoms.

But in addition there are other particles in a state which so far has concealed their identities. They seem to be molecules, which are large aggregations of atoms. How many are actual particles of dust.

Send Off From Stars
Dr. Hucop Stanford suggested that some of the atoms forming the cloud may have been shot off from the stars. This sort of thing has actually been observed on the sun, and streams in which the particles are so hot, or so heavily charged with electricity, that they shoot outward with sufficient speed to escape the sun's gravitation.

Still other bits of the cloud matter possibly never belonged to any celestial body, he added, and may always have existed in interstellar regions.

The picture this cloud makes of the Milky Way is that of a huge nebula.

The cloud's particles are presumed to be moving in haphazard fashion, swirling and eddying like droplets of vapor in a regular cloud.

Dr. Stanford's description, which represents the opinions of many astronomers, is set forth in a publication issued here by the Astronomical Society of the Pacific.

Siam Changes Name Editor, The Evening Herald: I take pleasure in extending to you my best wishes for a very happy and successful New Year. Our New Year in Thailand begins tomorrow, being the two thousand four hundred and eight-third year after the death of Buddha (B. E. or Buddhist Era 2483).

My country, although known to the world for almost one century as "Siam," has recently changed its name to "Thailand" which means Land of the Free and the people of Thailand are being called "Thai" instead of "Siamese."

Due to the fact that a large number of people have questioned me as to the reasons which brought about this change of name, I feel that I should take this opportunity to explain them to you and I hope that this information will also be of interest to your readers.

How the country came to be known as "Siam" dated back to an early period when contacts with foreign nations were few. Chinese merchants traded with the country through a small trading post by the name of "Sayam." For their convenience this name was used to signify the whole country of the Thai. The word "Sayam" was first corrupted to "Siam." Foreigners who entered the country later found it convenient to adopt the name used by the Chinese and called it the country "Siam." However, the name "Siam" was mostly used among foreigners but among my people, the country has always been known as Prades Thai. "Prades" means Land; "Thai" means Free. To facilitate foreign pronunciation, "Thailand" was adopted as the official foreign name of the country.

Thailand is a kingdom having a population of about 15 million, while it is estimated that the Thai race consists of about fifty million people, living in Thailand and the neighboring countries.

I shall greatly appreciate any efforts on your part in making the above information known to your readers.
