riddled with lead, have been dumped in the streets. Others have been
shot from speeding automobiles.

"This orgy of assassination has

Floods Take Lives of 10

Clearing Skies and Cooler Weather Promise of Relief.

By The Associated Press
Widely-separated sections of the
nation were inundated today by
spring floods which took 10 lives,
but clearing skies and cooler temperatures for the most part gave
promise of early relief.
Central and eastern Pennsylvania cities along the Susquehanna, Allegheny and Monongahela rivers were hardest hit and
crests well above flood stage were
expected during the day.

expected during the day.
South central New York state rivers—principally the Susque-hanna and Chenango—spilled from their banks from melting anow and rains, foreing hundreds of families from their homes and blocking roads. Colder weather, however, promised to halt the rises.

Thousands of acres of northern California farm land along the Sacramento river were covered by flood waters for the second time in a month and scores of farm families were forced to seek higher ground. Clear weather was foreast after nearly a week of heavy rains.

Six were counted dead across Pennsylvania, and four in New

York.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., prepared for a 34-foot crest—four above flood stage—sometime early tomorrow.

Flood control dikes, however, helped lessen the damage.

A state of emergency was declared at Binghamton, N. Y. threatened by above-flood stage crests expected late today. Seven hundred families were removed from low ground at Johnson City, N. Y.

Cancer Cases Increasing; Start Drive for Control Picked Units of Forces

the Public Health Service, declared today that cancer is increasing in the United States.

"It is becoming more and more important as both a personal and a public health problem." Param said in an interview at the start of "Cancer-Control Month" designated by a proclamation of President Roosevelt

nated by a proclamation of President Roosevelt.

Second Leading Cause of Death
The increase is caused in large
part, he explained, by the advancing average age of the population.
Cancer is the second leading cause
of death in the country, having
taken more than 140,000 lives during the last year.

"Early diagnosis and treatment
would have undoubtedly prevented
the deaths of thousands of these
people," Dr. Parran said.

He autocated that every state
and county develop an educational
organization cooperating with the
American Society for the Control
of Cancer and the Women's Field
Army to spread the knowledge that
cancer can be controlled. These
educational organizations, he said,
should promote formation of cancer diagnostic clinics, free laboratory service for physicians for cadivination of games of controlled.

Washington, April 1.—(A)— Dr. Since 1937 the Public Health Thomas Parran, surgeon general of Service, through the National the Public Health Service, declared Cancer Institute, has subsidized 19 individuals and institutions with research grants, has trained 36 specialists in diagnosis and trestment of cancer, has helped finance research work of 24 scientists into the origin and spread of cancer, and has distributed about \$200,000 worth. worth of radium to hospitals for cancer treatment without cost to

cancer treatment without cost to the patients,

Has Beilt Special Laboratory
The service has built a special research laboratory at suburban Bethesda, Md., where 20 scientists are studying the disease and coordinating knowledge gleaned from other research centers.

"A great deal is known about cancer but a great deal more remains to be learned in the comprehensive research drive against it."

Dr. Parran said. "We know, for instance, that certain coal tars and petroleum products will produce it, that heredity plays an important part, and that the sex increments have home relationship to the canustion of cancer."



"Your Doctor wants to KEEP you well" is emphatically and literally true, both of the individual physician and of medical scientists in general.

The administration of drugs, surgery and treatment of disease are by no means the sole functions of the modern doctor and scientist. He is just as active in the prevention of disease as in curing it. 




