Realty Firm Hears Report

Conduct of Business Satisfactorily Explained At Session Last Night.

Forty stockholders of the Manchester Realty Company, organized over 30 years ago to deal in second mortgages, met last night in the High school building to hear the report of the treasurer, Judge William S. Hyde, and to lift out any complaints that might be presented as to the management of the company's affairs. It was the largest meeting of the firm's stockholders ever held and it was concluded harmoniously with most of the complaining stockholders satisfied that the firm has been conducted in the best manner possible under existing circumstances.

Judge Hyde, noting to the stockholders that this was the annual meeting of the company, the annual session having been held on January 8, presented a complete financial report to the gathering. He reviewed the history of the real estate company from its inception at which time the firm had a net real estate value of \$100,000. The stock market collapse of 1929 was the real cause for the loss of the firm's funds. Good dividends had been paid until the early 30s when real estate valuations fell rapidly and hit the second mortgage holders hard. Discussing the possibility of liquidating the assets of the company, Judge Hyde said he did not think that wise since the stockholders could get little better than four or five per cent by such a liquidation. In Illinois, Mr. Roosevelt rolled up a 4 to 1 margin over the third term candidacy of Vice-President Charles McNary.

Dewey was unopposed in Nebraska, but his supporters had hoped for a big turnout as a harbinger of Republican strength in November. Mr. Roosevelt's total was running well ahead of the combined votes of the other candidates.

Robots Moving Into Crop Fields All Over California

Davis, Calif., April 10.—(AP)—Robots, with the ability to outwork dozens of humans, are moving into California's specialty crop fields, which have been heavy users of "steep labor," particularly in the hop, grape and nut orchards.

An imposing list of new machines reputedly able to reduce hand labor by 50 to 90 per cent are either at work or in process of development this spring in some of the orchards, gardens and fields which inspired the historic trek of job-seekers into the state.

Robots Moving Into Crop Fields All Over California

Delta, Calif., April 10.—(AP)—Robots, with the ability to outwork humans, are moving into California's specialty crop fields which have been heavy users of "stump labor," particularly migratory workers.

An imposing list of new machines reportedly able to reduce hand labor by 50 to 60 per cent are either at work or in process of development this spring in some of the orchards, gardens and fields which inspired the historic trek of job-seekers into the state.

Competing Against Labor But by their very nature they are competing more and more against steeper and steeper wages.

At the outset of the depression the top grower was using up to 600 hours of labor per acre of crop; vegetable producers 150 to 180 hours; fruit and nut growers about 120 hours; cotton planters about 100 hours and sugar beet raisers 80 to 100 hours.

The top growers evolved a machine that would pick the delicate pods of the high vines rapidly before as fast as human hands and it is not yet in general use but probably will do considerably more this summer in Oregon and California.

The sugar beet industry, a heavy employer of stump labor, evolved three machines which may take nearly all the "stump" work of the hand work out of the planting, cultivating and harvesting. They will be used this year in Colorado, Utah and Idaho as well as in California.

One of these implements, built by the University of California College of Agriculture here, cuts off the tops of beets still in the ground, preparatory to harvesting.

That used to be exclusively a hand job because machines couldn't follow the little irregularities of nature. Some beets grow large and high above ground; others small and low, and none ever in a really straight line.

But the university's topper burr sees along at three miles an hour, "feeling" each beet and adjusting the height of its cutting blade accordingly. The feeder and the blade have to work fast because the beets usually are less than eight inches apart.

The Agricultural College also has developed a beet lifter. First it loosens the topped beets with a plow-like blade, crabs each one by the hand and gives it a series of swift, upward yanks which are supposed to remove any clinging soil. It allegedly never misses a beet.

Camera Again Out in Open

Hollywood — (AP) — The talkie movie camera has come back into the open after 12 years of hiding its face and its noise. Daniel B. Clark, head of 20th Century-Fox Studios' camera department, recently announced that his staff had perfected a "silent" camera so quiet in its operation that it does not interfere with sound record. The invention has been used experimentally, he said, on some 25 feature productions. Improved models will be made available to other studios by the end of this year. With the coming of talking pictures, the noisy camera used in the filming silent movies had to be confined in sound-proof coverings to permit clear sound recording. Technicians developed "blimp" cameras which were built with plate glass fronts through which the camera shot. Laced technicians devised the "blimp" or camera cover — which enclosed the camera, deadened its sound, and left the cameraman outside. At first bulky, these "blimps" soon became streamlined and fairly compact, but cameramen everywhere dreaded a camera as light and mobile as they had used for silent filming. The new model has thrown off the blimp completely. It weighs between 25 and 100 pounds whereas the bulkier models weigh up to 600 pounds.
