Grain Bringing Higher Prices

Chicago, April 18.—(UP)—The wartime grain market is offering American farmers higher prices for their crops than they have received the past two seasons, due chiefly to the psychological effect of Europe's starvation. No part of the price upturn that has occurred since September—40 cents in wheat, 16 cents in corn, 12 cents in oats and 23 cents in soybeans—can be traced to any increased European demand upon domestic agriculture, grain exporters here are quick to point out. In fact, the war has restricted rather than increased European demand for grain. The price upturn is due to the fact that European countries are unable to produce enough grain to feed their own populations, and they are therefore forced to buy grain from the United States.

Eye-Witness Tale of Battle
