

the U. S. 10-cent stamp, above, released at Chicago, Ill., April 26. The stamp is the fifth of the ed-The stamp is the fifth of the educators group. Miss Addams is the third woman to be pictured on stamps of the series.

Described as "America's most useful citizen," Miss Addams devoted her life to the service of humanity, founded and developed Chicago's great Hull House, model for all settlement houses. Hull House has grown from a shabby mansion to a great enterprise, including 12 buildings. From it has come the impetus for the first juvenile court, playgrounds, health clinics, labor legislation and sociological education.

Miss Addams campaigned for peace and disarmament so vigorously that she was awarded the Nobel Prize in 1931, with Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler.
