3. The Swedes not only have a pledge of aid from the Allies, but they have proof of Allied aid in the person of British and French troops in the field in Norway.





Hull House has grown from a shabby mansion to a great enterprise, including 12 buildings. From it has come the impetus for the first juvenile court, playgrounds, health clinics, labor legislation and sociological education.
