Washington—The infantry of every nation has a boast about itself that goes something like this:
You can send your battlewagons, submarines, artillery, quartermasters, carpenters, engineers, or what-have-you, but until you send a foot soldier with a bayonet to plant his brogans firmly on the ground—and keep him there—you can't win.

Of course, hifsluting military people state the old saw a little differently. They put it this way:

The primary mission of the infantry is to close with the enemy in attack, and destroy or capture him on his positions. The infantry is the general mission of the entire force. Transports disguised as merchantmen landed troops before anybody suspected what was going on. Obviously, the Germans hoped to carry out a coup d'etat in Norway without firing a shot. If successful, they could have told the world that all the people in Norway—or most of 'em—were Nasis anyway.

It's True in Norway.

This spring in the mountain defiles of Norway, a couple of high class major powers are finding out all over again how true it is.

Looking back over the first few weeks of the campaign, it's a pretty safe prediction that both sides are moving fast in Norway to secure their positions too fast to keep their soldiers where their feet are now planted.

The Germans made the first miscalculations in Norway when they tried to mix power politics with military strategy.

That mixture worked in Poland last year. German spies, saboteurs, and information getters wormed their way into Polish graces, crippled the Polish mobilization by spying out concentration points, and signalled this to the German air force. Troop trains were bombed off the tracks.

Poland's air fields were shelled until the ware transports and submarine sums up at this early spring stage into a battle between some 75,000 German troops and 50,000 to 60,000 Allied troops fighting a long way from home. Supply lines are being torn up by special forces that can do no more than destroy and run.



Intense suffering will be the lot of more than a million Poles, he said, until new crops are harvested and the wheels of the country's factories begin to turn again. Destruction of production facilities, coupled with a lack of raw materials, has gravely reduced industrial opportunities and aggravated the misery the Red Cross is stempting to lighten, Mr. Nicholeon sent production of production facilities.

Latest figures place at \$434.000 the total expended or committed by the American Red Cross in behalf of the sick and wounded among Polish soldiers and civillans, including bedding and hospital medical supplies. 




