Most Important Plank For Republicans, Peace

Senator Lodge Calls for Army and Navy 'As Effective Aid in Preserving Peace'

Washington, May 7.—The "most important" plank in the Republican platform, Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) said today, should be maintenance of peace for the United States.

The Senator, who probably will be Massachusetts' member of the Republican National convention, called for an Army and Navy "as effective as in preserving peace for the United States, but not with a view to using them in the next future to help some foreign country."

Remembering that we constantly hear administration leaders saying there is no thought of sending American soldiers to Europe, Lodge said:

"I wish they would add in the next 'salvo, marines and aviators' to our foreign policy."

Views on Foreign Policy. Volving his views on "United States" foreign policy, Lodge, a captain in the Army Reserve, added that he would like to see a "totalitarianism in Europe would cause an economic depression here which in its turn, it is alleged, might lead to totalitarianism over here."

"But if we relax our credit restrictions, repeal the Johnson act and give supplies to the Allies, are we not scuttling private enterprise in our own land?"

"A struggle for any foreign cause," he continued, "no matter how noble it may appear, does not convincingly it may seem to affect our own interests, can only be destructive of American democracy in the end."

Without these all our internal reforms will melt like snow in the sun. Lodge outlined an 11-point program which he believes his party should adopt:

1.—Economy in governmental expenditures without sacrificing the needs of the people. 2.—Local control of unscrupulous government officials. 3.—Government jobs given on the basis of merit, without political influence. 4.—No consideration of race, color or creed to prejudice anyone in public service.

5.—No government competition in business with its own citizens. 6.—Security for the aged and a real chance and a real job for those in early life who have been forgotten. 7.—Constitutional government for the many and not for the few.
