Nazis Separate Belgian and Dutch Armies

German Place Allies In Serious Situation; Students Burn Flags

Great Battle Developing In Attack on Brussels; British Troops Co-operating with Belgian Soldiers; Few Days Before Course of War Can Be Told; Nazis Recapt Reaching Meuse.

London, May 14.—(AP)—Germany's smashing attacks created an "extremely serious" situation for Allied war-riors in southern Holland today. In Belgium a great battle was developing for possession of the capital, Brussels.

The British military sources appraising the widespread conflict for supremacy in the lowland countries said that it would be a few days before the course of the war could be told; but that British troops were co-operating with Belgian soldiers in defense of Brussels.

The Germans reported that they had reached the Meuse river to the east of Brussels between Namur and Givet and that the city of Liege was in German hands. The Nazis also said that their advance guards had reached Rotterdam, that they had broken through the Grebbe defense system in central Holland and were advancing toward Utrecht.

The Netherlands government of Premier Drees Jan De Geer arrived here today to join Queen Wilhelmina and the other members of the Dutch royal family who sought sanctuary in England.

Then it bore the "abundant life" label. What is to be tomorrow no man knows. But the label is of no importance, much. It is the sweetening up process that counts, especially with an election just around the corner. So, Tommy, pardon our presumption, if we suggest an appropriate election slogan: "Please pass the molasses." Some one will arise to ask what about the sulphur? Where does it come in? The reply is not difficult of discovery. It will appear in the sulphurous space adjacent to the next and subsequent generations. For long after Tommy and his medicine men associates are occupying their little narrow world, their children, and grandchildren, in multiplied taxes and lower standards of living, will still be paying for the present molasses affair.

Bolton Grows

Bolton's 44 per cent increase in population in the last decade is a good illustration of the trend of population growth in this country. The portion of that increase is due to the decision on the part of Manchester residents to make their homes in the farming area. During the past few years a number of local families have built homes in Bolton and are now living there. There is good reason for these changes. Bolton's outstanding feature is its very low and as a result the tax rate proves to be one of the lowest in the state. The government of the town is economical and the roads are in good shape through nearly every section. Good schools are maintained and the usual facilities for home comfort are nearly all present. Well water is readily available and modern sewage tanks make the electric disposal problem hardly. Sewer lights and telephone wires are laid throughout the town. As residents of Hartford move to Manchester to take advantage of the lower rents here, so residents of this town move to Bolton to take advantage of lower costs. The picture of natural population trends. If a family can better its lot by such a move it is only natural that the step be taken.

Then Was the Day

Long before the late James Vardaman recognized the Senate's undignified position of Hartford, there were Beau Brummits like Montana's William A.
