Approves Legislation On Fingerprinting

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—The Senate Judiciary committee approved legislation to require the fingerprinting of aliens, estimated to be about 400,000 annually, and penalties for "fifth column" activities.

Senator Connally (D., Tex.), sponsor of the bill, said it was necessary to take new defense measures.

The bill would also impose fines up to \$10,000 and prison sentences up to five years on anyone who subverts military forces or the distribution of an American literature or other means. It also would provide for deportation of all aliens who advocate overthrow of the government by force.

The House has passed similar legislation to require the fingerprinting of all aliens entering the United States in the future.

Swiss investors accounted for one-fifth of the \$40,110,000 purchase of American securities by foreigners during February. The Netherlands had net purchases of \$1,081,000, while the remainder of Europe took \$1,010,000.

Under pressure of war purchases, however, short term balances here declined \$3,183,000 to \$2,991,000,000 at the end of February. The net inflow of capital continued during the month, although at a slower rate. The net increase was \$2,077,000 compared with \$37,280,000 in January.

Heaviest sellers were Great Britain, which disposed of \$2,012,000,000, and Canada, which sold \$1,563,000,000.

The United Kingdom reduced its short-term balances through war purchases by \$2,764,000 to \$376,000,000. This brought the net reduction for the first six months of the war to \$21,910,000.

Foreign buying of American tobacco, wheat and flour, oats, dried fruits and canned vegetables fell off, too-leaving agricultural exports for April \$12,000,000, more than they had been in March.

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Capital's Flight Reflected Impure Metal

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—The impact of war developments on American business was shown today in a Commerce department report that exports declined \$27,000,000 in April, with the heaviest decrease in Scandinavian and Dutch trade.

Flight of capital from threatened European countries was reflected in a Treasury announcement that during February—the first time in ten months—foreign investors bought more American securities than they sold.
