Dunkerque was "under a semi-armed camp" held solidly. An ancient fortress, Dunkerque is protected by a semi-circular "moat" of muddy water several miles wide which runs from the sea when the Allies opened the canal locks.

Here two words (omitted) strips (three words deleted) connecting the port with the Planders plain from which the Allies are withdrawing are reported Army held by French and British units.

Military sources said that German advances from the south had gone to a halt at the water's edge.

On the northeast side of the port, they said, the Nazis have not yet reached the water barrier and the Allies are combatting them in the area between it and the sea.

Retreat in Solid Square. The French army, the military reported, is retreating in a solid square giving battle on all sides. A gigantic modern version of a classic Napoleon maneuver, the army is "literally forbidden" to give up the line.

Units at Calais were said still to be fighting despite violent German attacks. Localized patrol and artillery action reported at the Somme-Aisne-Meuse front.

The spokesman said that Dunkerque was holding solidly although the statement, he said, was not the night, including word of French troops at the port.

The commentator said the Allied force kept a continuous shuttle service moving in and out of Dunkerque, carrying in supplies to the armies and carrying out tired and wounded soldiers together with auxiliary units whose operations no longer were needed in the battle.

### Ask Financial Control Law

SEC, Investment Business Leaders Join in Present Move.

Washington, May 31.—(AP)—Spokesmen for the securities commission and a major portion of the investment trust business today recommended to Congress today enactment this session of comprehensive legislation to regulate investment concerns.

They submitted to a Senate banking subcommittee a draft of a bill which both endorsed the business spokesman said its principles had been subscribed to by 96 firms.

The SEC spokesman said they were still negotiating with representatives of "large amount certificate" companies and investment counselors in an effort to reach an agreement covering those branches.

The legislation offered was a substantially modified version of an original securities commission proposal which originally had been held and to which investment trust business spokesmen had objected.

The revised measure would, however, attempt to eliminate the same "abuses" which both the SEC and the business spokesmen had pointed out.

Announcing the new bill was a provision designed to stimulate use of investment company funds to approximately \$500,000,000 annually.

David Schenker, SEC attorney, said the draftsmen hoped this would be a "win-win" situation for both sides.

Although he did not specify what events had altered matters since he was before Congress, he said the SEC had received a letter from the business spokesmen which had changed so vastly in a very short time.
