Karl Marx was born at Trier,
in 1818, third of nine children of
a liberal bourgeois father. He was
educated to be a lawyer, turned
instead, to philosophy. His wife
Jenny, whom he married in 1843,
was devoted and loyal although
Marx pald more attention to writing about espital than to earning it.

ing about capital than to earning it.

His popularity was due to the efforts of Friedrich Engels, rebel son of a wealthy manufacturer. Marx was the scholar and philosopher; Engels the practical man, the cool, clear thinker, who translated Marx' ideas into language of the people. Engels paid most of the philosopher's bills.

Marx was no organizer nor adventurer. He did not plot nor lead revolutions. But he supplied the idea.
