Trains of Rumanian Wounded Arrive; Hungarian Army Corps Put on Frontier

Signs Legislation To Make Possible 50 New Warships

President May Increase Working Hours for Shipyards Above 48 Weekly, Employees to Receive Not Less Than Time - and - One-Half.

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—The Navy today ordered construction of 45 more warships, to cost a total of approximately \$500,000,000. The largest single contract-letting in Navy Department history, the construction was assigned by Lewis Compton, acting secretary, within two hours after the White House had announced that President Roosevelt had signed legislation to speed up the defense program.

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today signed speedup legislation making possible an immediate order to start work on 50 new warships. Under the law, which is to remain in effect for three years, the president in times of national emergency may increase weekly working hours in shipyards above 48, employees to receive not less than time-and-one-half for overtime, and thereby cut the completion time of ships by an anticipated 20 per cent.

Also, the secretary of the Navy may negotiate contracts for construction.

Profits Taxes Sought Today By Roosevelt

Asks Congress to Enact Steeply Graduated Levy Applicable to All Individuals and Firms.

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today asked Congress to enact a "steeply graduated excess profits tax" applicable to all individuals and corporate organizations "without discrimination."

The text of the president's message follows:

"We are engaged in a great national effort to build up our national defenses to meet any and every potential attack. It is our duty to see that the burden is equitably distributed, according to ability to pay so that a few do not gain from the sacrifice of many."

"I, therefore, recommended to the Congress the enactment of a steeply graduated excess profits tax, to be applied to all individuals and all corporate organizations without discrimination."

No Estimate on Revenue

Mr. Roosevelt did not estimate how much revenue an excess profits levy might yield. House majority leader Rayburn, who attended the White House conference which preceded the issuance of the president's message, said, however, that the tax would be along the lines of one levied in World War days.

The tax described would be both a revenue producer and a measure to hold down profits on war time business.

The congressional leaders were advised of the tax plan at a regular Monday White House conference with Mr. Roosevelt. Attending were Vice President Garner, Speaker Vandenberg, Rayburn, and Senator Byrnes (R., S.C.), Byrnes substituting for Senate majority leader Barkley who is in Kentucky.

Sees Convention Recede

Rayburn said the question of a congressional adjournment was brought up but that the Congress probably would recess July 11 for the Democratic convention. Also today Treasury and congressional leaders conferred on the tax plan.

Death Mystery Solved.
New York, July 1.—(AP)—Mystery surrounding the death of 18-year-old Dorothy Eberole was cleared up today when police found the gun they said she used to kill herself and arrested a man whom they accused of having hidden it after the shooting. Her body was found last night in the bathroom of her apartment in the Bronx. There was a bullet hole in her head, but no trace of the weapon. Police first considered the possibility of murder but later found the .32-caliber revolver with which she had been shot, on a nearby rooftop. After night-long questioning they arrested Edward MacDougall, 23, one of several guests at the Eberole apartment.

Humor Saxon to Resign.
Hartford, July 1.—(AP)—Resignation of Finance Commissioner O. Glenn Saxon as state finance commissioner next week was rumored here today without official confirmation. The report states that Saxon will return to the Yale faculty, which he left a year ago on a leave of absence, and that Budget Director Robert H. Weir will be appointed acting finance commissioner. Claude L. Taylor, assistant budget director, will move up to the position of acting budget director.

Graziani Given Post of Balbo; Triumphs Told

Rome, July 1.—(AP)—Marshal Rodolfo Graziani succeeded today as commander of all Italian forces in Libya as the high command reported triumphs in the air, on sea and on land.

Graziani, leader of the Fascist conquest of Libya and chief of staff of the Italian Army, already has flown to the North African colony to replace Balbo, who died in a flaming airplane with eight military associates at Tobruk last Friday.

Avers British Downed Plane

Rome, July 1.—(AP)—The plane in which Air Marshal Italo Balbo met death Friday was shot down by machine-guns in British planes when it appeared over Tobruk, Libya, while a British aircraft was under way, the newspaper Il Popolo di Roma reported today.

Although Il Popolo di Roma declared Balbo's plane was riddled with machine gun bullets, an authoritative source here said the exact circumstances of Balbo's death might never be known.

(The British Foreign Office announced last night "no British aircraft were concerned in the crash of Marshal Balbo's plane.")

"All that is known is that Balbo, with a group of his aides en route to Tobruk on a mission connected with their duty, arrived over the city at the moment an enemy air raid was in progress," this source said.

"Defense sources had gone into action both with anti-aircraft fire and fighter planes. Exactly what happened never may be known since those aboard the plane, who might be able to tell, were killed."

"But it is probable that Balbo, seeing a fight in progress, entered characteristically into the action and was shot down."

Outcome of Clashes With Soviet Troops; Near-Collapse Seen

Heavy Calling of Reservists Throughout Hungary; Railway Passenger Traffic Cut to Minimum to Facilitate Concentration Operations; See Entry Into Transylvania Now.

Bucharest, July 1.—(AP)—All Bucharest newspapers, by government order, carried in bold type on their front pages today a statement quoting The Associated Press as reporting that Soviet Russian troops had passed the agreed demarcation line and had penetrated into old Rumania.

Budapest, July 1.—(AP)—The mobilization of a Hungarian Army corps on the Rumanian frontier accompanied by the heavy calling of reservists throughout Hungary was followed tonight by an official news agency announcement that "the general impression is that Rumania is on the point of collapse."

Railway passenger traffic was cut to a minimum to facilitate military concentration operations.

The official agency's announcement was linked with the consistently reiterated official view that such a collapse would call for the immediate entry of the Hungarian Army into Transylvania to protect a Magyar minority there of almost 2,000,000.

Stress "Historical Mission"

Late this afternoon the Hungarian Foreign Office issued documents which stressed that the "historic mission" of Hungary is to defend western Latin civilization against any attacks coming from the east.

The documents declared that Hungary had "for centuries fought and bled for the western Latin culture" and attempted to prove that Transylvania must return to Hungary as its rightful owner.

Authorities here distributed thousands of notices to reservists in homes, factories and offices. In many cases the men were told to put on their coats and follow the police.

Airplanes flew over the capital dropping leaflets calling on citizens to support the Red Cross.

British Vessel of Orion Class Hit Off Brest; 18 Enemy Planes Shot Down in Raids

Berlin, July 1.—(AP)—The German Army has set foot on British soil for the first time by occupying the Channel Islands of Guernsey and Jersey in a surprise move by units of the Nazi Air Force. Guernsey was occupied yesterday and Jersey today, the high command reported.

Eighteen British planes were shot down in a series of attacks against anti-military targets in northern, western southern Germany last night, the high command added.

The communique declared that one submarine had sunk 23,000 registered tons of enemy merchant shipping, adding that the sunken steamers were torpedoed from a strongly protected convoy.

Five Ships in Class

The Orion class consisted of five cruisers, the Orion, the Leander, Neptune, Achilles and Ajax, the last two having taken part in the Battle of Montevideo which led to the destruction of the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee.

(The Orion's tonnage is listed as 7,215, her main armament eight six inch guns, and her normal complement 550 officers and men.)

British Fliers Hit at Troops

Cairo, July 1.—(AP)—British air attacks on Italian troops in East Africa were reported today by the Royal Air Force.

Its communique said: "R. A. F. bombers attacked troop concentrations near Serderat, Italian East Africa, scoring direct hits. No serious opposition was encountered. All our aircraft returned safely."

"Accio also was raided by a strong force of our aircraft, but the extent of damage created is not yet known."

Naval Vessels Bombed.

"Two naval vessels in the harbor were bombed. Our aircraft encountered considerable anti-aircraft and fighter opposition. One of our planes was missing."

"The South African Air Force and Southern Rhodesian Air Force carried out reconnaissance in the Corya area. One of our planes raided a bander camp."

"It is now definitely established that in the course of a raid on Tobruk June 29 we shot down three enemy machines, one RE-37, whose gunner was killed, being forced down behind hills, one CR-32 forced down and another CR-42 shot down at Amsat. The following day (yesterday) it has been definitely established, our successes were two enemy aircraft, one CR-32, the other a CR-42."

"Malta experienced further air raids yesterday, two formations of four enemy bombers each dropping 43 bombs. The damage was slight, two civilians were killed and four wounded."

French Losses Are 1,500,000

San Sebastian, Spain, July 1.—(AP)—French casualties in the disastrous final month of the war with Germany were estimated officially today at 1,500,000 men, most of them listed as dead or missing.

It took Adolf Hitler's mechanized Army approximately one month to destroy what 60 days ago still was described as the most efficient military machine in the world—the French Army—and to overrun and occupy in its blitzkrieg more than half of France.

Hundreds Die In Red Riots

Budapest, July 1.—(AP)—The Hungarian press and radio carried unconfirmed reports today that several hundred persons had been killed or injured Sunday in Communist demonstrations at Galati, Rumania, when Rumanian soldiers fired on a group of marchers who refused to disperse.

(DNE, the official German news agency, earlier had reported that several hundred were killed at Galati when Rumanian troops put down an "armed Jewish uprising.")

The German radio estimated the dead at 600, with many more wounded.

One demonstration, it was said, was initiated by a group of 200 persons who were brought to Galati by only a few miles from the Bessarabian town of Reni, reported occupied yesterday by Soviet troops landed by airplane.

Cavalry Patrolling Streets

Rumanian cavalry were said to be patrolling the streets of Galati. A communique issued Sunday by the Rumanian Ministry of the Interior said that about 10,000

Radio Waves Echoing Aid To Accurate Forecasting

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—The echoing of radio waves from the upper reaches of the atmosphere was reported today as the latest development in making weather predictions more accurate.

The system, developed by Prof. R. C. Colwell of West Virginia University and Dr. Albert W. Frieland of Harvard, consists of shooting narrow beams of short radio waves directly upward and receiving them by reflection about 200 yards away from the sending station.

The same method has been used by the Carnegie Institution of Washington to measure the heights of the radio reflecting layers which range from 80 to 200 miles above the earth's surface.

These electrified layers are caused by the bombardment of particles of air by radiations from the sun.

The West Virginia and Harvard

scientists reported in The Journal of the Aeronautical Sciences that the method makes it possible "to measure directly the altitudes of air mass boundaries and all other atmospheric discontinuities" changes sufficient to alter the radio reflecting layers.

"At present the Weather Bureau and various universities are exploring the upper air with sounding balloons which, with automatic radio sending sets, report back the temperature and humidity of the air and altitude of the balloon."

The balloons and radio echo records have agreed closely in tests with a network of radio sounding stations scattered at Weather Bureau stations. Dr. Frieland added, should be possible to follow the path of a storm or other changing weather conditions much more closely than is now possible.

Down Flock of Messerschmitt Fighters in France and Drive Off Raiders on Kingdom.

London, July 1.—(AP)—Britain today claimed double success in aerial warfare, with Germany in downing a flock of Messerschmitt fighters in France and driving off Nazi raiders stabbings sporadically at the island kingdom.

British fighters ranging over France bagged five Messerschmitts and "probably" destroyed another seven, said the air ministry.

Air defenders of the British Isles shot down one bomber and drove off the rest of the Nazi raiders flying over in forays which Neville Chamberlain warned were only the forerunners of a coming attempt at invasion.

The bomber crashed into the sea off the northeast English coast. Its crew of four floated four and a half hours in a rubber dingy, then was brought ashore. One was wounded.

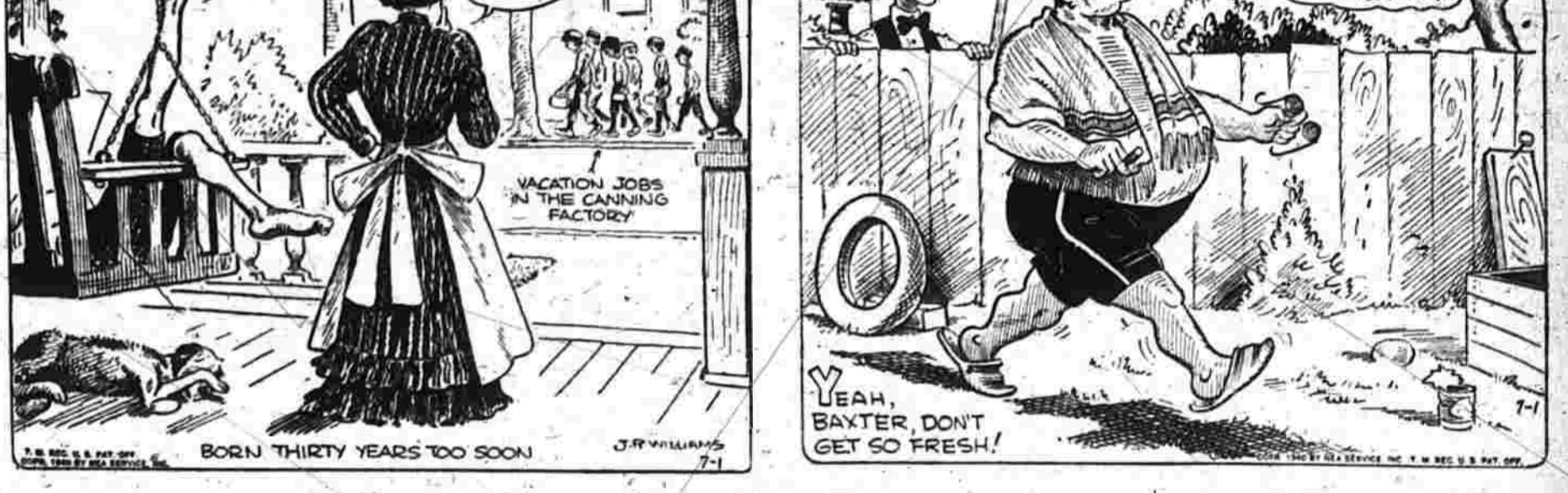
