The formation of this town wide organization to secure a fund here for British Relief was begun by the Mons Ypres Post, British War Veterans, Auxiliary and the Veterans group, the veterans unit has already held various money raising events in cooperation with post, auxiliary and last Monday night initiated a series of bingo games in Tinker Hall as their contributions to this cause. Several other organizations here have assisted the state agencies raising money for British relief and with the formation of the central committee next Sunday, it is expected that all local efforts will be coordinated.

Fred Baker, Post Commander of Mons Ypres Post, heads the steering committee of the post planning the formation of the larger and more representative directing group embracing all local societies of British origin. All other groups of British origin but sympathetic to the British cause or individuals with like leanings have been invited to attend the meeting Sunday.

It is the way the Courant feels about the Western Hemisphere situation. It is certainly entitled to its opinion. But when it argues in condemnation of the still unformed cartel project that the United States would be "holding the bag" and that before it is adopted Congress should be well advised of its soundness as a business proposition, the Courant seems to be completely out of touch with what is actually going on in the world.

Canada for Long Pull

Canada certainly has no belief in the British Empire's struggle against the Axis war lords in general, and in the United States in particular. On Monday night the Department of Munitions announced its decision to export twelve millions plants to Canada. This decision is certainly a very important one in view of the fact that Canada will be producing a large amount of munitions for the United States.

Out of Asia

Since France is entirely out of action in the Far East and the British government by its surrender in the matter of the closing of the Burma road has tacitly admitted that it is powerless to resist Japanese aggression, the United States is left, to all true effect, alone in that part of the world. Its course will very probably be decided on and hereafter strictly followed.

A situation has been created in Shanghai where Japanese are in a position to control the International Settlement in being constantly increased through Japanese terrorism, which is being met by the United States and her allies.

Despite the fact that the United States would be operating at a very great disadvantage so far as its bases, there are many Americans—and some of them are high naval officers—who have no doubts as to the ability of our navy to cope promptly with any Japanese sea power from the Pacific.

There can be very little doubt that the recent cockiness of the Japanese is the direct consequence of spurring by Axis agents and diplomats. Nothing better, right now, than to have the United States and Japan united in a naval war in the Pacific.

Until the aspirations of the Axis totalitarianism with relation to the Western Hemisphere have been definitely and finally destroyed or until we have had time to build our two-ocean navy, the United States cannot possibly afford the luxury of waging out Japanese power in the Pacific. And if we cannot afford that we certainly cannot afford to run the continual risk of being walled into a Far East conflict, even though the alternative appears to be getting along, slyly—until the notorious Supreme Court fight of 1937, then to do an extraordinary thing. He walked out on the whole show and went home to Texas and stayed there, completely abandoning his duties as president of the Senate, for many weeks.

Now, beaten in his best efforts to defeat the third-term candidacy, Garner is about to repeat that extraordinary performance. He is preparing to walk out—not only on the Roosevelt candidacy, which would be perfectly within his rights as a citizen, but on his job in the Senate. He is going home to his farm in Ohio.
