New York, Aug. 9.—A dozen or more broadcasts from up-per New York state, scene of the annual army war games, are being prepared by the networks for the next ten days or so.

The CBS schedule starts next Tuesday, to be continued through the following Monday. It will consist of daily programs covering the various aspects of the maneuvers and including a night description of an army scene from an airplane.

NBC is starting its programs Aug. 16 with an amateur night in an army camp following with a boxing night on Aug. 17, and continuing through Aug. 22 for summaries of activities in the field.

MBS also is setting up a schedule to provide a similar word picture of the events. Special field radio equipment has been installed to make the broadcasts possible. It includes mobile short wave apparatus mounted on army trucks.

Speaking from London, Crown Prince Olaf of Norway has been scheduled for a five-minute talk over the MBS chain at 12 noon Saturday in which he is expected to deliver a message directed to Norwegian sailors in American ports.

British Taking Half Exports

Result of Expansion in War Purchases, Closing of European Ports.

New York, Aug. 9.—British empire markets are taking about half the United States' total exports as a result of expanded war purchases and the closing of most of continental Europe to shipping, foreign trade sources said today.

One trade authority said the percentage of exports now going to England, Canada and other British empire markets probably is the highest since the United States became an important trading nation. Before the war, approximately one-third of foreign sales went to England and her dominions and possessions.

Trade trends and announcement of British plans for widening war purchases in the United States, it was said, indicate England and Canada may take an even larger share of the exports in coming months provided the British later hold out against the threatened Nazi attack and counter blockade.

Less Than Half Shipped.

Out of about \$2,900,000,000 in orders placed by British agents in an informal source said, less than half actually have been shipped. The bulk of the unshipped orders, it was said, are in the form of business in aircraft orders.

Because of the overshadowing importance of trade with England and Canada, business and financial circles anxiously have watched sea and air attacks on British supply lines. Some analysts contend closing of United Kingdom markets on top of the cessation of dealings with the continent, might be a hard blow temporarily for certain industries, such as steel.

10 Per Cent of Output.

The "Iron Age" reported Great Britain was buying steel here at the rate of 600,000 to 600,000 tons a month, or nearly 10 per cent of the current output.

Out of \$30,000,000 in exports in June, the United Kingdom took \$7,200,000 compared with \$30,000,000 in June, 1939 and Canada \$60,700,000 against \$39,820,000 in the 1939 month.

The chief British empire markets together, including Australia and South Africa, took about \$164,000,000 of this country's exports and sold here \$51,613,000, leaving a wide gap to be covered by transfer of gold and other liquid assets to the United States.

Bureau of Standards declared in a joint article that during the northern winter and southern summer radio signals going north and south are 25 times greater and 15 times less variable than broadcasts between the United States and Europe.

Washington, Va., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Health officials of two states today renewed warnings of a possible major outbreak of infantile paralysis in this Ohio valley region where more than 40 cases of the malady have been reported in the last two weeks.

Dr. A. M. Price of Charleston, W. Va., head of the state health department's Division of Preventive Diseases, said the outbreak had reached "epidemic" stage at Huntington, where 28 cases have been listed, and named six West Virginia counties adjacent to Ohio and Kentucky as "danger zones."

First Victim Dies

At Louisville, Ky., Assistant State Health Commissioner P. E. Blackberry said 20 active cases of infantile paralysis had been reported in eastern Kentucky within 60 days, mostly in counties bordering Ohio and West Virginia.

Dr. R. H. Marwitt, Ohio health director, said at Columbus no new cases were reported yesterday but that previously ten persons had been stricken at Portsmouth and one at Ironton. He conferred with West Virginia authorities to determine whether the disease was entering Ohio from West Virginia.

Members of the Cebell county medical society meeting in Huntington today discussed the possibility of postponing the opening of schools scheduled for Sept. 9—the date City Health Officer W. W. Strange said the malady should be "at its peak."

Although Dr. Strange expected no major epidemic, he termed the situation "serious" and appealed for strict enforcement of a voluntary quarantine of children under 18 which has closed theaters and playgrounds and suspended Sunday school classes.

Prevalence of the disease has postponed several meetings, but more than 3,000 persons were here for the State Democratic Judicial Convention as the warning was issued today.
