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Change in Nazi Plans Seen as Mass Raids Are Dropped Today

Nazi Report Results Of Warplane Raids Made During Night

Berlin, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The German high command reported widespread damage done to airfields, harbors and industries in southern and middle England in a series of night raids, but said only scattered planes to make "armed reconnaissance" and photographic flights across the channel in daylight operations today.

The number of day flights was small because of the unfavorable weather, said DNB, official news agency. The German sources said air forces were also effectively dropped a bomb which destroyed five British planes on the ground.

The communique said air attacks were made at Cambridge, Kateschurch, the site of an airplane manufacturing plant, and at the location of an important airport, said DNB.

Blows were struck, the high command said, at the harbor and at the airport at Eastchurch, where several bombers were heavily damaged by bombs.

Some smaller ships in port were also damaged, first reports indicated.

Overdue Liner Arrives With English Children

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Germany's Air Force Represented by Solo Planes; Strike Heavy Blows in Southeast; Coast Resort Bombed Twice; Three Nazi Bombers Shot Down; Small Damage Today.

London, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Germany's air force blanketed England with scattered solo raids today, striking its heaviest blows in the southeast, where one coast resort was bombed twice in the early afternoon.

Three Nazi bombers were shot down by British fighters, and a fourth was believed to have plunged into the English channel.

Almost constant patrol of Spitfires and Hurricanes were kept in the air as reports indicated a change in German tactics from mass raids to scattered "sneak-in" attacks by individual bombers.

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New England Recruits On a Training Cruise

Many Among Youngsters on Battleships; When They Return Will Get Navy Rating.

New York, Aug. 21.—When a nor'easter blows down the New England coast, the salt air must reach back into the hills, for the young men from the mountains and the seaport towns alike show a hankering for the sea.

The battleship Wyoming made a training cruise in July with 600 apprentice seamen, and 70 of them returned from New England.

When three battleships of the Atlantic fleet made a similar cruise, 1,500 more will be naval reserve seamen, 100 were from down east.

His father, a naval aviator, was a member of the crew of the USS Intrepid, which was the first aircraft carrier to be commissioned.

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Mud Pies Show Engineers How to Build Canal Locks
