Cigar Wrapper Industry Makes County Wealthy

Quincy, Fla., Aug. 28.—(AP)—An other necessities for the actual growing of shade tobacco is the use of insecticides. The industry in this section, with about 200 growers, provides year-round employment for nearly 6,000 persons, mostly Negroes. Tenancy and share-cropping are rare. The tobacco is tied into "hands" of about 30 leaves each and ripened. At the packing houses the "hands" are stacked into neat piles about nine feet long and four feet wide—two tons. A thermometer is inserted through a tube into the middle of the stack. When the natural heat-producing properties of the tobacco bring the temperature to between 110 and 120 degrees, the pile is carefully turned down, the hands are shaken to air them properly, and the stack is rebuilt, with those originally in the middle now on the outside, and those that were on top moved to the bottom.

Shade tobacco is grown under huge canopies of thin cotton cloth to make the leaves thinner and broader, and to protect them from insects, sun, wind and hail. Gadsden County, Florida, in which Quincy is the largest city, is the center of shade tobacco production in the south, and largely because of the industry, Gadsden is the richest county per capita in Florida.

Developed Shade Process The first tobacco reportedly was brought to the county in 1814 from Tennessee county, Virginia, and the late D. A. Shaw of Quincy developed the process of growing under cover in 1868. His idea was to get a thinner, finer textured leaf that was free from insect damage and would make a cigar more appealing to the eye.

Before then, nearly all fine cigar "wrappers" were grown in the East Indian island of Sumatra. Now, shade tobacco is grown also in Connecticut.

There were about 8,000 acres under cover in two Florida counties and just across the line in two Georgia counties this year. It is not grown appreciably any place else in the south.

Salem, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Charles I. McNary followed up his formal acceptance of the Republican vice-presidential nomination by laying plans today for a campaign speaking tour.

The veteran Oregon senator had conferences scheduled with national and state party leaders, who are expected to meet at the State Fair grounds here.

McNary criticized the Roosevelt administration's farm program, particularly its reciprocal trade policy, which he said had failed to "disinfect, alleviate or liberate" the "unproductive conditions" facing agriculture.

He asserted that in spite of subsidy payments, farm income dropped the seven-year record of \$2.4 billion last year.

He held that "any secretary of agriculture would be hampered by the reciprocal trade system."

Power "Common Heritage" The vice-presidential nominee urged that the federal government continue the development of hydro-electric power.

He advocated maximum benefits for domestic consumers, farmers who "should be the yardstick by which we measure the usefulness and serviceability of every Federal dollar."

He told the crowd that he opposed "any type of national dignity, independence of action, or political freedom, and the civilized values we cherish."
