Plans Further Home Building

Greenway Park to Be Further Expanded; May Erect 98 Houses.

Lawrence A. Converse, directing operations at Greenway Park where 25 houses are now under construction, announced today that plans are now nearly completed to carry on a much greater building project than was at first contemplated.

Mr. Converse stated that it has been decided to build 98 houses in the tract. It is in a section already provided with water, gas, electricity, sanitary sewers and fire protection, which gives it a rating of 90 per cent in FHA classification.

The property is bounded on three sides by the street and is being cut through such additional roads as will be necessary for further developments, can easily be done and provide a good grade.

It is necessary, in the preliminary arrangements, to remove 40,000 square yards of dirt from the hill in the southeast section of the tract to bring the land to street grade. All of this building is to be added to the grand list of the Eighth School and Utilities District.

In the matter of sanitary requirements, the new sewage plant completed last year can take care of this addition.

Legion Hears Nation Must Keep Ideals

Roosevelt Message Declares 'American Way of Life' Must Be Protected Against Peril.

Boston, Sept. 23.—(P)—Amid patriotic fanfare, the 22nd annual convention of the American Legion today heard a declaration by President Roosevelt that the nation must protect "our American way of life" against "any form of aggression which may endanger it."

In a message read by National Commander Raymond J. Kelly to a colorful, uniformed throng in the flag-draped Boston arena, the president said:

"We now find abroad serious conflict between those who wish for peace and free government and those who wish to destroy that peace of strength has gathered force, and whether we like it or not, today it constitutes a threat against the peace of the entire world."

'Monster' Bomber Paces Nazi Raiders;

Stinking of Refugee Ship

Some Attack London; Gunners Clear Skies; 83 Children on Vessel

London, Sept. 23.—(P)—The sinking of a British refugee ship with a total of 293 persons, 83 of them children en route to Canada, stunned Britons today and brought headlines of "murder" in the London press.

The government waited until today to announce the tragedy of almost a week ago to give time for a week's opportunity to notify the children's parents in London, Liverpool and Middlesex after exhausted inquiries were brought to a northern port of England.

The ship, her name undisclosed, was torpedoed 600 miles west of England and sank in a stormy sea within 20 minutes after she was attacked at 10 p. m. last Tuesday, the announcement said.

118 Brought Back Alive

Of 400 men, women and children aboard, only 113 were brought back alive by a warship which reached the scene at dawn. The stories of heroism and horror they told indicated many perished in the tremendous explosion which ripped the ship.

Some were swept from wave-tossed lifeboats, or died of injuries and exposure in the night of cold and sleet.

Some boatloads sank while huddled children clung to the words: "Roll Out the Barrel."

One boy comforted a dying nurse, long before rescue, with the words: "I can see boats, nurse. It's all right."

The captain went down with his ship, shouting to the children to "Take care of yourselves."

The government said the children were brought to a hospital in London.
