Chamberlain Quits British Cabinet Post; Nazi Raiders Shower Bombs on London

Reds Sock Ball Hard to Gain Early 5-2 Lead Over Tigers

Churchill Gives Labor More Prominent Role; Attack in Thick Haze

Anti-Aircraft Barrages So Heavy as to Tie Up Traffic Mark Late Afternoon Attack by Germans; Shell Fragments Fall Like Hail On City; Guns Send Up Steady Streams of Steel

London, Oct. 2.—(P)—Anti-aircraft barrages so heavy as to tie up traffic marked a late afternoon attack on London by unseen German raiders today and some British quarters suggested that the Nazi air offensive may have turned to "blind" high altitude bombardment. Anti-aircraft shell fragments fell like hail on the city. Nazi raiders thrust at the capital through a thick haze in their fourth visit of the day, showering bombs on northwest and southeast sections. Anti-aircraft guns sent up constant streams of exploding steel.

Cabins who had been piled their trade in the worst barges refused to stir this evening after from their cutting stands for trips into the central part of the suburbs.

Flames hidden by smoke. The attacking planes were hidden by the smoke, apparently using flares only through use of flying instruments.

Some British sources said that this might mark a new phase of the Luftwaffe offensive—flight above the clouds beyond anti-aircraft range, location of London by instruments of navigation and then stripping of bombs over the city.

I would be impossible with such weather to hit objectives within the city.

After the air raid warning had been sounded, the intensity of the barrage turned the London haze to a glowing red. Droning motors could be heard.

Among the objectives attacked, the Air Ministry said, was the great Krupp works at Essen—Germany's biggest armament plants. The docks at Hamburg and Wilhelmshaven also were said to have been hit.

Germany Using Fighter Planes To Drop Bombs

Change Part of Evolution Nazi Air Force Has Undergone as Result of Stiff Resistance.

London, Oct. 2.—(P)—Germany's Messerschmitt fighting planes, hitherto used almost exclusively as fighters and bombers, are being converted into high-speed, low-level bombers. British aircraft experts have discovered.

This change, the experts have concluded after an exhaustive examination of German aircraft wreckage, is a result of the stiff resistance they have found in the aerial siege of England.

Extra armor-plating is being put on both the Messerschmitt 110 twin-engine plane and on the single-engine Messerschmitt 109. The British said. The former times carries four 50-kilogram bombs.

It is still there, and a foot deep even on Kodiak Island, 100 miles away. The eruption "set loose not only 10,000 smokes, but countless jets of steam from vents in the valley floor ranging from tiny cracks to craters 150 feet in diameter, some 500 feet high."

Army to Play Principal Role in Paraguay

Rising Power Behind Military Dictatorship in Formation Warns 'Professional' Politics.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Oct. 2.—(P)—Col. Ramon Paredes, the rising power behind a military dictatorship reported in formation in Paraguay, has served notice that the Army intends to play the main role in the political life of that country.

Paredes, minister of interior and labor in a new military cabinet chosen by "provisional" President Gen. Higgin Moringo after withdrawal of the military, heads the Army faction said to be supporting Moringo in maneuvering to give the Army a monopoly of control.

Paraguay's president to the nation yesterday by Paredes was printed this morning by the Buenos Aires newspaper "Los Nuevos" which quoted the colonel as warning "professional" politicians they would face the Army's might and continue Paraguay's military dictatorship.

Paredes' military cabinet was formed by the late Marshal Jose Felix Estigarribia, whose presidential career was cut short by death in a plane crash Sept. 6.

"Drastic Measures of Justice"

The version published here said Paredes declared that "drastic measures of inexorable justice shall be meted out to professional politicians who have been taken with high regard to fairness and they shall be applied only to bad patriots while good citizens shall have the government's full support and enjoy all liberties and all constitutional guarantees.

Reports Japan Plans Attack On Singapore

(Continued From Page One)

Foreign commentators, calling Singapore the pivot of British positions in East Asia, declared: "Japan is seeking a place itself in the best possible position strategically against Singapore in anticipation of being forced by English hostility or the intervention of new allies of England to attack and throw down the pillar of Singapore."

Particular attention on Greece. The authoritative Fascist publication, *Il Giornale d'Italia*, focused on Italian attention on Greece again today and declared any Axis intention to end the African war in the Balkans would be in violation of the view of the government in London.
