Briggs Stadium, Detroit, Oct. 4.—(P)—The Detroit Tigers exploded a three-hit attack that resulted in one run in the fourth inning today to tie the Cincinnati Reds at 1-all midway in the third game of the World Series and the rivals entered the seventh inning with the score still deadlocked.

Bill Werber, Cincinnati third sacker, started the Reds' outbreak when he belted Bridge's first pitch to left field for a double. Mike McCormick fanned but Ival Goodman, leading batsman of the series, singled to center field to send Werber home.

Washington, Oct. 4.—(P)—A former German-American Bund member told the Dies committee today that the Bund in New York City had been trained for "the day" when a government similar to that of Germany would take over the United States.

Richard Werner, 36, soft-spoken New York chef, related in detail that he and other Bund "storm troopers" were taught military tactics and the use of rifles.

"Our leaders told us many, many times how we must be prepared—must be fit for a certain day—that that day was coming," Werner replied.

Willkie Urges End to Class War in Nation

Asserts Unity Would Enable Development of Strong Defense, Revitalization of Industry.

Aboard Willkie Train en Route to Philadelphia, Oct. 4.—(P)—Wendell L. Willkie told a sun-splashed audience at Harrisburg, Pa., today that elimination of class distinctions, which he declared the New Deal had fostered, would help improve economic conditions in the United States.

"I call America back to unity," said the Republican presidential nominee, asserting that unity would enable development of a strong national defense and revitalization of industry.

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Police Ponder Neglect Case

Two Infant Brothers Under Medical Observation at Bridgeport.

Bridgeport, Oct. 4.—(P)—Two infant brothers were under medical observation at St. Vincent's hospital today as health and police authorities pondered complaints of neglect against their mother, Mrs. Dolores Brainerd, 176 Spruce street, who at her home with two other young sons defied authorities to take her children from her.

Two of her four sons, Joseph 16 months old and Anthony, two months old, were taken from the small second floor flat of the Brainerds late yesterday afternoon after police and the city ambulance were summoned by neighbors aroused by the crying of the four children in Mrs. Brainerd's absence.

Suffer from Malnutrition Physicians said the two youngest suffered from malnutrition and that Anthony may have rickets.

Patrolmen John Ford and Wilbur Kelly in a radio car were first on the scene, followed later by the ambulance and about a half dozen more police. They in turn summoned Health Inspectors John Halpin and William Sullivan who began an investigation which they will report to Health Officer Richard B. Shea.

Police said that when Mrs. Brainerd returned home yesterday she was apparently unaware of the serious condition of her two youngest boys and pleaded for leniency. Today, her flat washed by and neatly in order, she blamed her plight on "noisy" neighbors and asserted she will get the "best lawyer in town" to retain her children.

Nazis Report Bombing Of Britain Continues

Gas Works, Armament Factories, Air Camps Targets; Bad Weather Cuts Scale of Attacks.

Berlin, Oct. 4.—(P)—Bombings of a gas works in northwestern London, armament plants in Coventry and Chester in England's industrial Midlands, and of British aviation camps were reported by the German high command today. A communique said the air war against Britain was carried out yesterday despite bad weather, but informed sources said the attacks were materially reduced from their previous scale.

Only one British plane was able to penetrate German territory because of the unfavorable weather, and its attack resulted in no noteworthy damage, the high command said, but it was admitted that attacks had been made on the Norwegian coast.

Married More Successful Avoiding Hazards of Life

Eagle Rock, Calif., Oct. 4.—(P)—Married people have fewer problems than unmarried and are more successful in avoiding prison, insane asylums and the undertaker, Dr. Paul Popenoe, general director of the Institute of Family Relations, declared today.

"The extraordinarily high rate of insanity, suicide and imprisonment, and the short span of life, of the single, divorced and widowed as compared with married persons, is the best possible evidence that those outside of marriage do not lack serious problems," he said in an address prepared for delivery at a conference of the institute.

Unmarried Slump Into Rut A study of 5,000 persons made by The National Recreation Association, Dr. Popenoe said, "showed that it is the unmarried, not the married, who slump steadily into a rut."

"Single men and women both showed a greater falling off of interests than did the married," he added. "Moreover, the middle-aged married persons expressed an eager desire for more activities still, for which they lacked time. The single were satisfied with their rut; they wanted nothing more than they already had."

Education of Women Failure Dr. Popenoe cited "the fact that the divorce rate of college graduates is four times as high as that of college graduate men," as indicating that the present education of women, largely dominated by unmarried women, is a failure in too many instances. "Home and school have been too widely separated," he declared. "More married teachers (men and women), more parent participation in school activities and more school recognition of home activities will help to bridge the chasm."

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Mussolini and Hitler Discuss All Problems; Britain Sinks 9 Subs

Destruction of Destroyer Also Announced; Report Pounding at Unidentified Southeast Coast Town in Area Regarded as Likely Landing Place Is Worst Experienced.

London, Oct. 4.—(P)—As if to even war scores after Britain announced destruction of nine Axis submarines and a destroyer, German planes in relays thundered up the Thames against London this afternoon and blasted viciously at a southeast coast town. British sources said that the pounding of the unidentified southeast coast town—in an area long regarded as the likeliest place for an attempted German landing—was the worst it had experienced.

Earlier, in the same region, German coastal guns on the French shore poked a British convoy out of the murky dawn on the Strait of Dover and raked the ships with booming salvos.

Shells Shake Houses On Shore—Shells geysering the water of the strait shook houses on the Kentish shore. It was not disclosed in London whether the Germans scored any hits, but it was said that the convoy, tugging its own anti-aircraft balloon barrage, steamed on around the coast, past the Cap Gris Nez promontory where the German guns were firing.

The roar of attackers coming up the Thames estuary signaled the Nazis' return to the Battle of London after the quietest night of the 27 since the air siege of the capital began.

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Planes Scout Oil Field Area

Rumanians Press Investigation of Alleged British Sabotage Plots.

Bucharest, Oct. 4.—(P)—Eighteen Rumanian battle planes flew in a "defensive reconnaissance flight" over Rumanian oil fields and Bucharest authorities said today as they pressed an investigation of alleged British sabotage plots against gasoline shipments for Germany.

Some of the planes were German-made Messerschmitts. Secret police questioned for hours A. Miller, director of the British-dominated Astra-Romana Oil Company, who was suddenly turned over to them today by persons reported to have kidnaped him two days ago.

British legion officials, after interviewing the oil man in his cell, said he had been beaten during the 48 hours he had been held by a band of youths in plain clothes.

Frontiers "Sensational Statement" Legion officials promised a "sensational statement" later, said the Miller case.

It said that still unknown was the whereabouts of Percy Clark, 40, president of the A. Florest oil engineering firm, who the legion charged was kidnaped yesterday in circumstances similar to the seizure of Miller.

Legation officials immediately sought to interview Miller but said at noon they still had no information where he had been held or by whom.

Italian Navy Flees Battle With British

Warships Return to Alexandria After Failing to Fight in Two Seas.

Alexandria, Egypt, Oct. 4.—(P)—After failing to draw the Italian Navy into a fight during a 1,800-mile sweep of the Mediterranean and Aegean Seas, but downing four Italian planes, British warships were back in port today claiming a "victory" over their own Air Force in a mock attack.

Officers said big guns were given a thorough workout in battle practice when the vessels ward off a mock raid by Britain's own fleet air arm.

A strong Italian Naval force was sighted once, about 100 miles away off the coast of Italy, as the British made their four-day zig-

British Raid German-Held Dutch Coast

Royal Air Force Hammering Without Rest Today After Series of Forays During Night.

London, Oct. 4.—(P)—Hammering without rest, Britain's Royal Air Force was officially reported to have attacked the German-held Netherlands coast in daylight today after a series of forays yesterday and last night in which shipping and harbors from Rotterdam to Cherbourg in France were assailed and a convoy off Dunkerque given a spray of bombs.

Masses of barges were said to have been discovered when one daylight raider followed the meandering Maas river in Holland to Heusden. High explosives hit many of them, said the Air Ministry communique.

Session Leaves World to Wonder What, 'If Any' Move Planned as Fuehrer Heads Back to Germany Through Brenner Pass and Il Duce Rolls Southward in Armored Trains Today

Brennero, Italy, Oct. 4.—(P)—The directorate of the Rome-Berlin Axis, Benito Mussolini and Adolf Hitler, held a three-hour council of war today and discussed "all the problems" confronting their countries, according to a communique issued just before their parting. Hitler's armored train headed back through Brenner Pass at 2:40 p. m. (7:40 a. m., e. s. t.), and Il Duce's armored train rolled away southward five minutes later, leaving the world to wonder what, if any, world-roving move had been planned.

The door of the dining car on Mussolini's train opened at 2:35 p. m. and the Fuehrer and Il Duce stepped out, followed by German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop and Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano.

Reviews Honor Guard Hitler reviewed the honor guard of grenadiers.

He shook hands with Mussolini, said goodbye and entered his car. Then he stood at a window exchanging Mussolini's salute with outstretched arm.

Immediately afterward, while a military band played the Italian anthem and a group of blackshirts cheered, Mussolini entered his train with Ciano and departed.

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Italians Mass Along Border

Forces in Albania Are Shifted to Positions Near Greek Frontier.

Athens, Greece, Oct. 4.—(P)—Italian army forces in Albania, totaling 130,000 men and 120 tanks have shifted their positions to new posts near the Greek frontier in the past few days, official sources said today.

Troop movements from Italy to Albania, Italy's recently acquired territory in the Balkans, have been frequent recently, and numerous ships are available in the Adriatic to speed additional forces across the narrow sea if needed.

Official sources, however, expressed belief that Italian strength in Albania still was under 200,000 men.

All Precautions Taken. "All precautions have been taken by Greece against surprise from any quarter," official quarters declared.

The Fascist press several weeks ago voiced demands for a share of Greece's northern Epirus on behalf of Albania.

Reports of Italian troop movements reached here as Adolf Hitler and Premier Mussolini were engaged in a dramatic conference at Brenner Pass.

The Green Army is virtually on a basis of "permanent concentration." Border garrisons have been fully manned since the anti-Greek campaign in the Italian press became hottest more than a month ago.

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Shaking Tomatoes Pays, Windsor Experts Assert

Hartford, Oct. 4.—An experiment conducted this year by the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station at the Windsor Station on soil management plots has indicated that shaking tomatoes increased production of the very early, high-priced crop, experts were reported today.

The results, said Dr. Morgan, indicate a possible increase of 150 bushels per acre or one of the more effective two-stem training. However, the price of stakes and the most additional labor required to set the stakes and trim the plants represent items in the vegetable grower's budget. A thrifty farmer, getting his stakes as cheaply as possible, training his labor to work efficiently, can realize real profit from shaking tomatoes. Less expense is required for stakes when the plants are trained on wires. Large Star Systems Seen 'Capturing' Smaller Ones

Pasadena, Calif., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Dr. Erik Holmberg advances a theory that just as larger countries are taking over smaller ones in Europe, so large star systems far out in space are "capturing" smaller ones and forming double and multiple systems.

His paper, released today, holds a special interest for Mount Wilson Observatory men because it came here on a fellowship from the Swedish Academy of Science.

Dr. Holmberg started home in Sweden soon after the outbreak of hostilities in adjoining Norway. He is now in the United States, where he is a member of the Mount Wilson Observatory staff.

His astronomers are trying to determine whether the universe is stationary or, as some contend, is expanding at an explosive rate which eventually would bring the stars together.

Support Stationary Universe

Dr. Holmberg reported that several of the results of his investigation "furnished strong support for the assumption of a stationary nebular universe."

"Assuming an originally random distribution of stars," he continued, "we may expect that multiple systems will be formed by gravitational attraction of orbital forces."
