Local Men Draw In the First Hours Of Nation's Draft

Charles A. Hogan, of 29 Wellington Road, First Name; Wife Is Notified By Herald Reporter; Sketch of Names Chosen Up to Press Time; 47 Names Are Selected

With 380 capsules drawn in the draft lottery at Washington by Herald press time this afternoon 47 Manchester serial numbers had been extracted from the famous fish bowl.

First Name Here Manchester's first name drawn in the national draft lottery corresponding to number 158 selected by Secretary of War Stimson on the first draw from the famed 'goldfish' bowl, was that of Charles A. Hogan of 29 Wellington Road, a sales engineer employed by the Westinghouse Electric Company of Hartford.

Notified by Reporter Mrs. Hogan greeted Herald reporter at the end of her home five minutes after the Associated Press teletype machines had carried the number 158 to the waiting staff members of the hotel.

Your husband's number was drawn first in Washington this afternoon by Secretary Stimson," the reporter said.

"So I have been told," Mrs. Hogan replied. "Someone—I don't know who—just called me on the phone and informed me of that fact. Mrs. Hogan was smiling and not the least perturbed by the news of her husband's selection.

Hege But A Year Mrs. Hogan told The Herald that her husband had been a year and that her husband was employed by the Westinghouse Electric Company of Hartford as a sales engineer.

The second name drawn was 162, corresponding to Michael William Wabreck of 193 Maple street. He is employed as a machinist in an East Hartford plant.

Biographical Sketches The first man whose number was drawn here, Charles Augustine Hogan, was born in Boston, Mass., Dec. 19, 1904 and is 35 years old. He is six feet, two inches in height and weighs 190 pounds.

Herbert Clifford Fraser, who was called up with number 165, was born in Manchester, Dec. 20, 1911, is 29 years of age and the youngest of the first three drawn. He is married and lives at 245 Highland street.

Willkie Sees New York Address as 'Alarming Manifestation of What Desperation Does.'

New Haven, Oct. 29.—(P)—The drawing of a three digit number—158—for the first figure pulled in the national draft lottery meant that 65 men in Connecticut, one in each of the state's draft areas, would be among the nation's "first 47."

Addressing an outdoor campaign rally near Jackson, Ohio, the Republican presidential nominee said he was shocked that "the third term candidate, who will still be the chief executive for another month or so, would make at a time like this the purely demagogic address he made last night."

Report on the success of the WPA Bookmobile project as carried out in the rural portions of Hebron, Bolton, Andover, Ellington, Franklin and Bozrah during the past year makes interesting reading. The bookmobile brings books to those who live beyond the limits of town libraries, penetrating the back districts where roads are apt to be poor and bring reading matter to those who have been practically deprived of it before the advent of the traveling library.

Miss Matilda Avery of Colchester is the acting librarian. She says that the Hebron calls are very satisfactory in her work, as a certain time to go to a common room to look up books. In some cases Miss Avery has taken care of babies while mothers were away. Book borrowers who are drawing all kinds of handiwork are in demand. "Main Kampf" is very popular. There are many calls for biography, antiquities, travel, etc. and many women are also out for "Westerns" and detective stories for their husbands. They say Hebron, which has a population of 1,003 as shown by the last census, has had 220 borrowers during the year and 5,618 books were taken out. This is more than any of the other towns on the list but less than some other.

Many of the readers are old people, some are "shut in" invalids. Miss Avery feels that the bookmobile is doing an indispensable service. There was a storm of protest when some months or a year ago there was a threat to do away with the service.

There is now a WPA library supervisor for the entire state. Miss Avery will be directly responsible to her on the matter.
