### Battleships to Be Completed Sooner

Philadelphia, Nov. 20.—Two 45,000-ton super-battleships may join the U. S. fleet a half-year ahead of schedule.

The Navy yard announced today the purchase of duplicate machinery for construction of the giants—the New Jersey, whose keel was laid last September, and the Wisconsin, whose keel will be laid next year.

Authorities said the new arrangement should mean completion of the New Jersey early in 1944, with the launching of the Wisconsin shortly thereafter. Present schedule call for both to be ready in 1945.

### Swiss Dissolve Nazi-Like Group

Bern, Nov. 20.—The Swiss government dissolved today the totalitarian "national movement," an organization which a publicist close to the government recently called a "true copy of Germany's National Socialist party."

The action was Switzerland's answer to the movement's "standstill" for recognition as "an equal bearer of new political and social ideas."

The Federal Council said in a communique last night the movement had planned to overthrow the government by issuing secret instructions, establishing secret cells of party members and creating a semi-military, strong-arm youth squad.

### Navy Rushes Training To Triple Manpower

Most American Sailors Native of Inland Communities; Undergo Rigid Tests, Schooling.

(Editor's Note: In doubling the size of its Navy, the United States is increasing the personnel by three times. Here, in the third of a series of six daily notes on the Navy, are revealed many little-known and interesting facts about the men who compose our sea and air forces. Tomorrow's Navy is a quarter threat to all its rivals.)

Must Have Clear Record. To enlist, he must have been either native born or fully naturalized, at least 17 years old, at least 64 inches tall, without dependents and unmarried. He had to furnish a list of employers, teachers, and to have the proper character of under 21, and clear of any police or juvenile court record.

Three of every four applicants go through the physical, physical, physical. He is put on the waiting list. Rarely does the Navy fail to have men waiting for its own fleet.

Roosevelt Hears Admonition at Service on Peace and Security.

Hyde Park, N. Y., Nov. 21.—President Roosevelt worshipped today in the Episcopal chapel of the Hudson valley village in which he was reared and heard an admonition from the Rev. Frank R. Mason that Americans must pass on to others their blessings of peace and security.

The Chief Executive and members of his family participated in a special Thanksgiving communion service.

"This great country enjoys so much," said the president, "that we can not just sit back and gloat in that. We have an opportunity to work to do it. We must pass these blessings on to others."

Repeating how a small lad named the patriarch had told him he was thankful for being an American, Mr. Roosevelt said that "we find practically no place, nowhere else in the world today, can children be as thankful as we are in America."

He inquired solemnly what home, parenthood and other basic things of life could mean any where else in a world at war.

The regular Episcopal Thanksgiving service was followed, with the pastor reading from St. James 1:19-20: "Let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God." And, again, he read from St. Matthew VI:34: "Let us therefore be anxious for the morrow; for the morrow shall take thought for the day."
