Washington, Jan. 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt ignored the holiday to put in "the first real licks" on his annual message to Congress—an address awaited for a follow-up and elaboration of the policy he outlined in his defense talk to the nation.

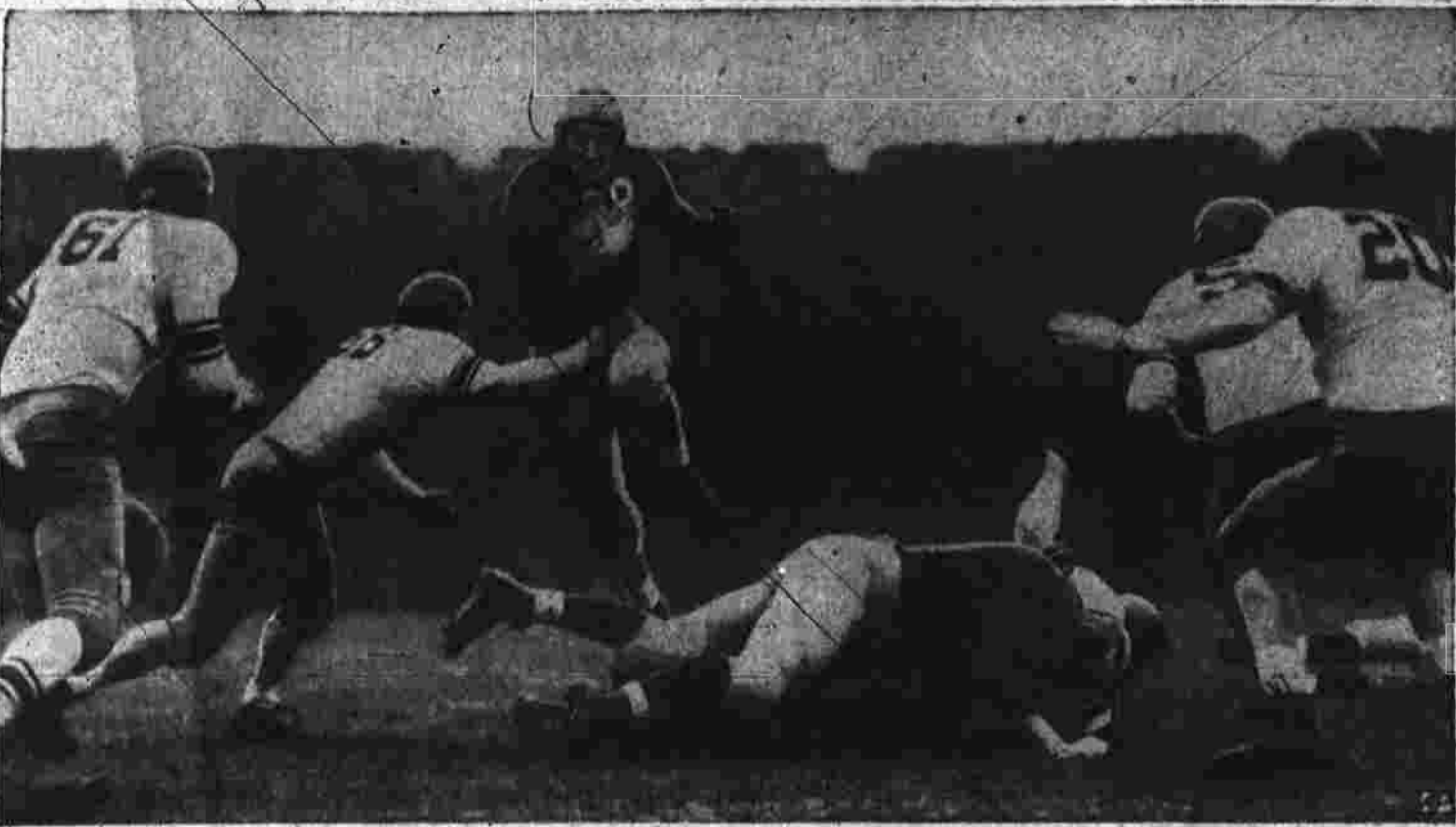

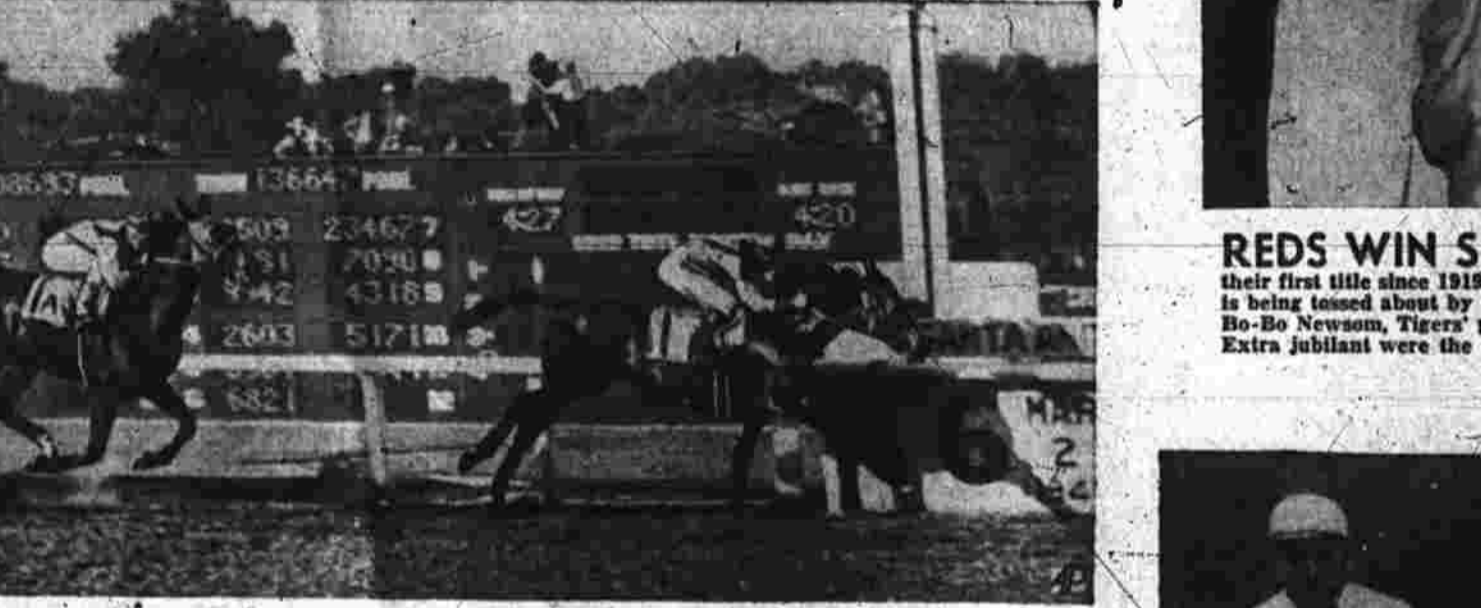

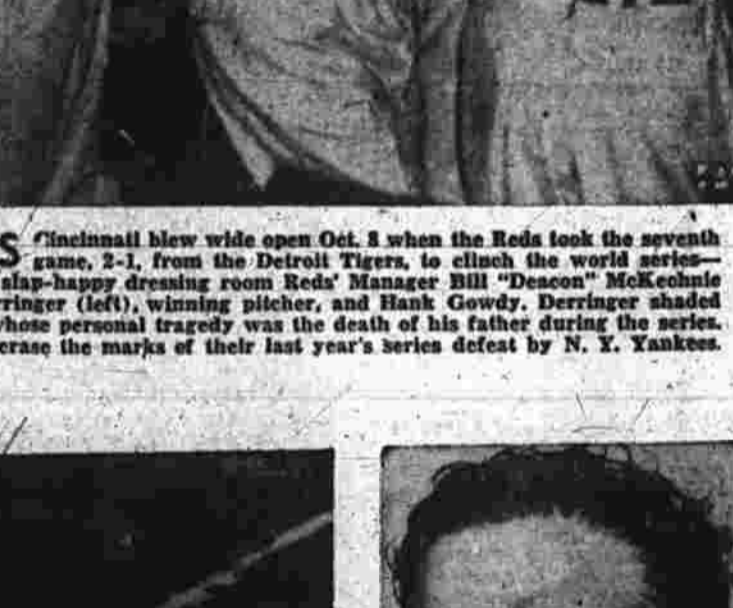

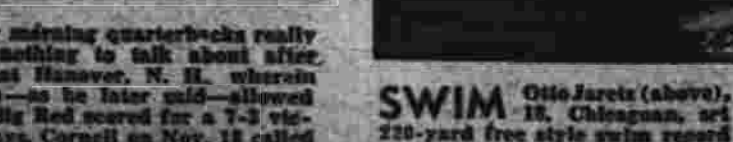
