The people of Hungary can no longer enjoy cream because the Nazis are demanding more butter. Restaurant menus are strictly limited and "one-dish" days have appeared. The storekeeper on the corner mutters because a group of German soldiers in civilian clothes marched into his shop and stocked up well on hame, salami and other delicacies for the cold trip into Rumania.

Taylor has three old "pepperboxes" of the pre-Civil War period, the guns dating from 1849. They are the type of gun often seen in the movies of Buccaneer days and pistols of this type were used in the movies. "Mutiny of the Boundary." the movies, "Mutiny of the Boun-ty." Incidentally, these guns were made in Windsor, Vermont. The collection contains several fine old "six-guns" of the boom mining period of the west and one of them, an old Colt Frontier pistol, has three notches cut in the handle. The gun was presented to Taylor by a representative of the Canadian Northwest Mounted Police

clude several well-made small der-ringers that hark back to the old steamboat days of the Mississippi. These guns were said to have been carried by river gamblers. They were so small and yet so deadly that they could be secreted in the coat sleeve. They are of four-barrel type and fitted with revolving firing and care. These derringers were also carried by women in their hand bags for protection. They were aptly named "Terror" and "Defender".

In the five years that Taylor, a traveling salesman and a recent arrival in Manchester, has been gathering his collection, he has secured many fine models including several modern pistols of foreign and American make. Several of the Colt guns in the collection date from London, England, later from New York after Mr. Colt came to this country and latterly Hartford. The small derringer models were made by C. Sharp & Co., Philadelphia in 1859.

Two of the finest guns in the collection are of German manufacture,—Lugers pistols. One of these, a Mauser pistol, used during the World War by snipers, is
