Army Planes Former WPA State Head In Test Fight Off Bombers

"Defend" New England And New York With Aid of Observers; Boston Attacked 10 Times

New York, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Army planes were seen yesterday flying over New England and New York today from a score of theoretical attacks by "enemy" bombers in the first tests of the air defense command's aircraft warning system.

They were seen over Oyster Bay, Long Island, was intercepted four minutes after it was spotted.

Widespread Disorders Reported in Rumania

Street Fighting, Bombings Injure Civilians; German Soldiers and Communists in Cities.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Widespread disorders in Rumania, with street fighting and bombings injuring civilians, German soldiers and Communists in the streets of Bucharest and other cities, were reported in diplomatic dispatches today.

Some sources in the other Balkan capitals attributed the Rumanian outbreak to bitter rivalry between extremists and more conservative elements in Rumania's Iron Guard.

Others suggested that increasing resentment in many quarters over German military concentration in Rumania and against the regime of Premier Ion Antonescu might have had a hand in the disorders.

There were reports too, the disorders might be part of an insurrection by the Iron Guard, a fascist, anti-Semitic, anti-Communist organization.

Reports of the disorders were believed here to be supported by the reports of a plan to establish a German base in the vicinity of the Danube river from the German border to the Bulgarian town of Kiusiu.

It was reported here that they had been raised to Bucharest and other cities in the Balkans.

Diplomatic sources here said that the regular Rumanian broadcast from Bucharest station was interrupted suddenly by a speaker who derided German troops and pro-German supporters on the air.

Both Bulgaria and Budapest reported receiving word of heavy casualties in clashes of Iron Guard groups and in fighting between Communist troops and pro-German forces.

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Others Disagree With View; Those Favoring Entrance Believe U. S. 'Would Find Way to Carry R. Through'

Opponents Assert Action Would Cut Down War Materials Flow

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy reported to Congress today that some high British officials believed the United States should go to war with their nation against Germany but that others disagree with this view.

Those who favored United States entrance into the war, said the retiring envoy to London, did so because they felt that this nation would find the way to carry through. Officials opposed to the idea, he said, believed that it would cut down the flow of war materials to Britain.

Kennedy, who arrived in London for 12 months after Britain went to war and went through more than 200 air raids, appeared before the House Foreign Relations Committee today to testify on the administration's plan for loaning aid to Britain against Germany.

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Jap Minister Hits American Stand in East

Matsuoka Hopes United States Will Reflect Seriously on Attitude; Britons Told to Leave.

London, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Foreign Minister Matsuoka today expressed "earnest hopes" that the United States would reflect seriously on her attitude toward Japan's ambitions in Greater East Asia, both "for the sake of peace in the Pacific and the sake of peace in the world in general."

Later today, the British consul at Tokyo, who reported to have sent letters to his district advising Japanese officials to leave East Asia, both "for the sake of peace in the Pacific and the sake of peace in the world in general."

The United States "apparently maintains the idea that Japan's first line of national defense lies not only along the eastern Pacific but even as far as China and the South Seas," Matsuoka said. It would become her to secure Japan of having "ambitious designs."

Other waves of benefit plans were said to have been drafted and ported to the Senate. Wagner said he was engaged in the defense program, and that he was interested in the social security law, but eventually that he was coming to it.

Wagner said that the plan would be paid regardless of the amount of wages received in their old age from the government's contribution, an individual could make deductions for old age benefits from their salaries.
