## Shea Gets Delay On Hurley's Plan For Airport Site

Senate Republican Leader Succeeds in Getting Time to Study Provision of Bill Offered By Governor to Buy Land for Airfield.

State Capitol, Hartford, Jan. 23.—(P)—Action on a bill for the acquisition of a northern Connecticut site to be used as a United States Army airport was delayed today in the Senate by a Republican effort to get more time to study its provisions after Gov. Robert A. Hurley had asked for its immediate passage. Senator William J. Shea, Republican floor leader, asserting that Republicans had not been consulted on the measure, unsuccessfully attempted first to have the bill referred to the Appropriations Committee and then succeeded in getting Democrats to agree to a temporary delay.

Two houses recessed to give its leaders an opportunity to confer on the measure, submitted earlier in the day by the governor together with a special message urging "immediate action" on it. Debate this afternoon began. Leaders said the bill probably would be debated late this afternoon. Hurley recommended to the General Assembly that it authorize immediate acquisition of a 1,700-acre site.

In his first special message to the Legislature, the chief executive expressed the belief that an "emergency statute" requires "your immediate action." With the message, he sent a bill authorizing the state parks world commissioner to acquire the property, located in Windsor Locks, Hartford, one of the state's principal defense centers.

## Britain, Head Of Shanghai's Council, Shot

Japanese Riot When Body Votes Down Opposition to Tax Raise; Jap Labor Leader Held

Shanghai, Jan. 23.—W. J. Keewick, British chairman of the Shanghai Municipal Council, and two Japanese council officials were slightly wounded today in a riot in the city. The riot broke out after the council voted to raise taxes to meet the cost of a new municipal airport, killing the chief pilot and a passenger and injuring 12 other persons.

## No Combination Seen Able to Win in War; British Take Tobruk

More Than 14,000 Prisoners Seized in Capture of Italian Base in Libya; Four Generals and Admiral Included in Prisoners; British Casualties Said to Be Under 500.

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 23.—(AP)—British headquarters in Egypt announced today that the capture of Tobruk, Italian Libya base, was completed last night and that more than 14,000 prisoners were taken. A communiqué said the prisoners included four generals, one a corps commander and another a divisional commander, and an admiral. British casualties were said to be less than 500.

Enemy casualties are not yet fully ascertained, said the communiqué, but it is believed that 2,000 wounded already are being evacuated.

A number of senior Army and Naval staff officers were listed among the prisoners. "Tobruk has been called the best harbor between Alexandria and Tunis."

British troops which pursued the Italians from Kharga, in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, met the border of Italian Libya, where the British had taken up defensive positions. The capture of Tobruk with a 36-hour lull and sea assault culminated a siege that gave the British undisputed control of 80 miles of the Libyan coastline and an ideal base from which to continue their westward drive.

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Against this force the British were said to have hurled five full divisions. When the Italian entered Tobruk, the communiqué said, the town was in flames and the old harbor was a floating fortress. An anchored in the harbor and had been used as a floating fortress. ## Believe Some Fighting Continuing in Rumania

Legations Declare Antonescu Has Mastered Rebellion; High General Joins Dissidents.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Although Rumanian legations in southeastern Europe declared today that Premier Gen. Ion Antonescu had mastered Rumania's rebellion, diplomatic sources here expressed belief that some disorders were still in progress.

They pointed out that at least one high general had joined dissident Iron Guardists. Like statements on behalf of the Bucharest government, Budapest and Sofia said in part that Gen. Petre Petrescu, former minister of interior under Antonescu, had organized a nationalist attack on the premier's office. The attack was said to have been broken but the statements did not say what had become of General Petrescu.

According to a legation statement, Antonescu claimed continued collaboration with "the majority and responsible element" of the nationalistic Iron Guard.

Before the statements were issued hundreds were reported to have been killed in the civil strife, within the German-dominated north. The rebels were said earlier to be holding several ministries, the telephone headquarters and the post office at Bucharest. At one time rebels claimed to hold the German coast to Rumanian Transylvania.
