National defense preparedness became a major influence in 1940 and will grow increasingly important during 1941. With Connecticut business activity dominated by war orders, plant expansion and reconstruction are proceeding rapidly. Employment, man-hours worked and payroils already have risen to record high levels, although work has hardly begun on the large volume of orders received in recent months.

Telephone business naturally reflects these unusual conditions in industry and, measured by accepted yardsticks, is more active than at any time in the past. The net

The net gain in telephones during 1940 was 22,934, the largest in any single year of the Southern New England Company's history, and almost 50 per cent greater than in 1939. Telephones in service at the end of 1940 totaled 383,338, or 16 per cent above the predepression peak of July, 1931.

Estimates indicate that the 1941 net gain will surpass that of 1940, probably reaching 25,000 telephones, including many large and small private branch exchanges and other intercommunicating equipment serving subscribers with anywhere from a few to several hundred telephones.
